EDUCATOR BLASTS

THIS NATION IS BESET by far too many groups who are trying to twist basic American principles to suit their own convenience according to Dr. Arthur F. Coons, president of Occidental College of Los Angeles.

In his annual report to the college trustees, Dr. Coons declared that many groups and their leaders "argue and behave as if we were still in the forests of pre-colonial America or traversing the western plains or mountains beyond the reach of the law.

"The age-old social struggle between free-

dom and order continues.

"Yet the answers are not in violence, or deprivation of right, or denial of opportunity, or abandonment of fair play, lest civilization

The greatness of the nation, he added, rests upon the morale of the people and the morals

they possess.
"If we are to develop understanding and discriminating judgment, help students to understand and rightly to use the concepts which they are taught; it we are to help them to know the dynamics of our society . . . and to develop a love for and a devotion to morally responsible behavior, then one place for it should be in the give and take of the classroom . . . "
