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HUTCHESON URGES WILKINS REELECTION TO NATIONAL POST

STRONG SUPPORT for the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King following the shocking attack on the distinguished Negro leader by FBI director J. Edgar Hoover was expressed at the recent quarterly meeting of the Southern Area Conference, West Coast Region, NAACP, at Compton, Calif.

A unanimous resolution was adopted by the assembled delegates from the Southern California-Southern Nevada section urging officers and members of affiliated branches to write President Johnson, their Governors and Congressional representatives deploring the unwarranted and intemperate accusations leveled at the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize winner by the nation's head G-man. Another highlight of the two-day meeting was a scholarly plea by Dr. Roy Hutcheson of Washington, D.C., that all branch presidents support Roy Wilkins for reelection as National Executive Secretary of the NAACP.

Dr. Hutcheson stressed Wilkins' long devotion to the civil rights movement, his stature among national Negro leaders and the valuable contacts he has made during his many years of dedicated service to the NAACP.

ESPECIALLY SIGNIFICANT was the advice offered by a prominent Pasadena, Calif., attorney, Samuel Sheats, nominee for president of his branch and chairman of its Legal Redress Committee. Sheats strongly advised that NAACP activities be given the widest possible publicity. He said it was vitally important that programs and resolutions adopted at branch meetings be fully exposed to the public through mass communication media such as local newspapers, television and radio.

The opening joint adult-youth session, which was called to order by Southern Area Youth President Eugene Kelly, was featured by the inspiring remarks of special guest Mrs. Medgar Evers, widow of the martyred Mississippi NAACP official. Mrs. Evers was introduced by the Rev. Ellis H. Casson, Area president. Laplois Ashford, National Youth Council

Laplois Ashford, National Youth Council secretary, then delivered a stirring and challenging address on problems arising from de facto segregation, a particularly aggravating condition in many Northern cities.

Ashford, a native of Mississippi, pointed out that trouble-breeding racial ghettos exist in practically every city in the North, as well as the South, where large numbers of colored people have congregated. He urged parents to form groups to meet with school boards in organized attempts to eliminate the many problems c a used by segregated education. He also cautioned parents to be wary of zoning and
