

"Joy to the World the Lord is Come; Let Earth Receive Her King."

This verse strikes a note which occurs again and again in the account of Christmas. Much of the emphasis of the

worship of the Church at Christmas is on Christ's coming as a King, not just as a baby who would grow up to teach the world a bout righteousness and truth, not only as one who would give His life upon the cross for our salvation--but as a King. "Our King and Saviour draweth nigh; O come, let us adore Him." It was because He was a King

that Herod was afraid of Him and tried to slay Him as a child. It was because He was a King that the other kings of the earth came to do Him homage. He was born in Bethlehem, the royal city of David. Throughout the whole Christmas story we are reminded that a new era had begun; Christ's Kingdom has been established. A sovereign has come to reign.

tabilished. A sovereign has come to reign. If this is true, Christmas is not just a looking back, not just a reminder that once God came into this world for a brief time. Christmas has a forward look also. It is a reminder that He came to change the whole course of human events and Christmas marks the beginning of a reign in which we share today and to the fullness of which we look forward. The secular history of the West has a continuity---a golden thread running through it despite dark ages and periods of regression. Christmas marks the beginning of the reign of Christ that must ultimately extend to all the people of the world and to all aspects of our human life when they are brought under His sovereignty.

When we look at Christmas that way and then look at our newspapers, we can become awfully discouraged. The modern world is not being influenced primarily by Jesus Christ. New and other forces seem to be affecting the destinies of men. It can be discouraging to think of Christ as a King. If we remember that Christ came at Christmas to reign, then the contrast between the message of Christmas and what we read in our papers is startling. It does not look much like the reign of our King!

Does this mean, then, that we should give up to discouragement, and just enjoy the private message of the Christmas stories? No, to do that would be to deny the truth that lies behind them all, for the truth is that at Bethlehem the God of history showed himself. This was not just a prophet or teacher come to bring a brief vision of love and hope. Here was the God who made the earth and ruled its history. Here He was coming to assert his sovereignty. The Kingdom which began at Bethlehem must go on to include every aspect of our human life. Hopes may be deferred, but the King must reign.

Let us look more deeply at the Christmas message. Let us remember that Christ is the revelation of that which is ultimately true, that which is supremely strong, that which is essentially real. Therefore his Kingdom has to come. Let us deepen our faith, let us recollect that here at Christmastime, despite appearances, Christ's reign really did begin. The battle may be long and there may be many reverses, yet if this Jesus Christ is the revelation of God himself then He must triumph and we can go forward in that faith. Christmas brings us, therefore, a message of faith. It reminds us that at the heart of this world, transcending its darkness, transcending its cruelty, transcending all its discouragements, is Jesus Christ. His reign has begun and we can in faith and trust carry on in confidence that ultimately it will succeed.

And if, first of all, on Christmas we are given faith to carry on despite all discouragements, we must then be moved to dedication. For faith is not just for our comfort. It is for our commitment. His Kingdom has come and

# Christmas Services Set At Local Catholic Church

SPECIAL CHRISTMAS SERVICES at St. James Catholic Church have been announced by Msgr. William J. Devlin, as follows:

The midnight services on Christmas Day, Dec. 25, will begin at 12:01 a.m. with the Solemn Procession of the Divine Infant to the Crib, which will then be blessed.

Following immediately will be the High Midnight Mass of Christmas, sung by the St. James Choir, with the parish partaking of Holy Communion.

The Second Mass of Christmas will be at 11 a.m. and will be a Low Mass, accompanied by the Children's Choir. The Third Mass of Christmas will be at 5 p.m. and also will be a Low Mass. Those who receive Holy Communion at the Midnight Mass may again participate in Holy Communion at the later Masses on Christmas Day.

Thursday, Dec. 24, is a Fast Day and a Day of Abstinence from meat, but abstinence may be observed on Dec. 23 instead. Confessions will be heard on Christmas Eve from 4 to 5 p.m. and from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m.
