"TOGETHERNESS IS THE KEY for getting your job done," Dr. West told the society members. "If you act together you can create your own rewards, which will enrich you in many ways and at least partially compensate for your inadequate monetary rewards."

Noting that enactment of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 has given the Negro new hope by removing many obstacles that have encumbered his progress, Dr. West reminded the teachers that it is largely up to them to equip the disadvantaged child--"the real problem child"--with the fundamental training needed to prevent the development of an inferiority complex that could lead to a disastrous sense of inadequacy.

Dr. West suggested, among other things, that the teachers do everything possible to increase parental interest in the educational progress of their children and to encourage, and participate in, pre-school programs. He expressed the opinion that it was inadvisable to assign teachers with strong southern accents to primary grade instruction "because it complicates the young child's problem of communication" and he further suggested that, whenever possible, the pupil-teacher ratio in the first three grades should not exceed 15 to 1.

"You must solicit public support for attaining these goals by making the public fully aware of the seriousness of this great American problem," he said. "If you do a good job on public relations, you will find many new allies to help make your job easier. . . Accomplishing such a program will enrich America--and yourselves

--immeasurably, and the Great Society inevitably will be realized. . . United you will succeed."
