This was my impression upon meeting Henry J. Moore and I feel sure his faculty colleagues and pupils at Western High must feel the same way, because I understand the head of the Science Department at the West Bonanza Road school is a very popular pedagogue.

That he is held in especially high esteem by bis fellow-teachers, both at Western and other

local schools, is at-tested by the fact that Henry Moore was selected as the first president of the newly formed Professional Teachers Society (Pi Tau Sigma). He also is a member of the executive boards of the local NAACP and the Westside Federal Credit Union, a Mason-Shriner, an Elk and active in church affairs at Zion Methodist.



Other affiliations include memberships in the American Federation of Teachers, Classroom Teachers Assn., National and Clark County Science Teachers Assns., American Chemical Society and the U.S. Scientific Roster.

Following his graduation from Lincoln High in Milwaukee, Mr. Moore attended the University of Wisconsin and received his BS from Alabama State, where he was a Negro All-American football halfback. He also has graduate degrees from Marquette Plastics Institute, Nevada Southern and Stanford.

He was awarded a fellowship to the latter university and also holds an Outstanding Achievement Award from the U.S. Interior Dept. But he seems proudest of having been named Clark County's "Teacher of the Month" not so long ago.

Mr. Moore came to Clark County as a chemist with the U.S. Bureau of Mines at Boulder City after serving in a like capacity with tanning and steel companies in Milwaukee. He had previously taught chemistry at Alabama State, so when there was an opportunity to return to teaching at Western High, he decided to leave government service and resume instruction in chem-

istry, physics and mathematics.
"In teaching, I have an opportunity to develop talent and I get a lot of satisfaction in passing on my knowledge to some one who will in turn pass it on to some one else or put it to good use otherwise," Mr. Moore explained. "It is something I can leave to posterity."

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


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
