A veteran of World War II and the Korean "incident", Sgt. Daniels also served on Okinawa, in the Philippines and Hawaii. His awards and decorations include the American Campaign

Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Philippine Liberation Ribbon, United Nations Service Medal, USAF NCO Academy Graduate Ribbon, National Defense Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal Clasp (silver with two loops), and Air Force Longevity Service Award Ribbon with four Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters. An official communique issued by Col. Lloyd W. Brauer stated, "During his more than 20 years of military service, Sgt. Daniels has rendered distinguished and exemplary service to his country and the United States Air Force . . . The Commander, officers, airmen and civilian personnel of Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, join in wishing Sgt. Daniels good luck and Godspeed in his retirement."

A native of Atlanta, Ga., where he graduated from Booker T. Washington High and attended Clark College, Sgt. Daniels now resides here in Continental Village with his attractive wife, Mary, and their four children, Olivia, James Jr., Robert and Leslie.
