

Incidentally, Jim Deskin, a vice president of the WBA, will be at ringside in Chicago tomorrow night and also is scheduled to sit in on the three-day meeting of the WBA executive committee ending Sunday. Jim intends to ask for a workshop session during the conferences to discuss possible guidelines for referees and judges in scoring fights. Something along this line is long overdue.
