"MIXED" HOUSING DEVELOPMENT SET IN WEALTHY AREA

NEW YORK, N.Y.—A 111-acre interracial housing development is under way in a hitherto all-white area of country homes and estates in northern Westchester County, 40 miles from New York City.

Pliny Fisk, a white real estate operator whose ancestors settled in this country before the Revolutionary War, is president of Peak Homes, Inc., the developer.

Paul Zuber, the Negro lawyer who fought for New Rochelle school integration and other civil rights causes, is the executive vice pres-

The tract of land is beside U.S. Route 202 west of the hamlet of Somers and east of Lincolndale. Most of the area is sparsely developed, but one of the neighbors of the development is Lincoln Hall, a Roman Catholic school for delinquent boys.

Most of the development tract is zoned for one-act home sites. Peak Homes proposes to build 81 houses in the \$23,000-\$28,000 range and make them available to all buyers regardless of race, color or creed. Fisk said it would be the first upper-middle-income interracial development in northern Westchester County.

But it took strong stands against apartheld and continued white rule in Southern Rhodesia and in the Portuguese territories of Angola and Mozambique.

There was occasional dissension but little open conflict.
