ALBANY, N.Y .-- A 54-year-old New York City tailor last week was elected sergeantat-arms of the New York State Assembly. William A. Wardlaw was said to be the first Negro to hold the position in 30 years.

Backed by Democrats who now control both houses of the State Legislature, Wardlaw succeeds a brewing company salesman from upstate Lowville who was elected to the job 12 years ago. The post carries a salary

of \$3,500 per session. A captain in the Democratic party's 13th Assembly district, Wardlaw lives in Harlem with his wife and son. He is active in Masonry, social work and church activities.

has been sworn in as New York City's first woman borough president. In assuming the presidency of the Borough of Manhattan, Mrs. Constance Baker Motely also became the nation's highest paid feminine public official at an annual salary of \$35,000.

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
SIXTH GRADERS
