The Rebels permitted the Gators to build up a big lead of 21 points midway through the second half before closing the gap to four counters in the late going. San Francisco State then cashed in on Rebel miscues in the final few minutes to win by seven.

Nevertheless, it was quite a feat for the local team to make the playoffs in the very first year Nevada Southern was eligible to compete in the NCAA eliminations and the Rebs' overall record of 21-8 for the season was most creditable.
