As the article also noted that private housing was not mentioned in AB-384, but that a bill Mr. Kellar helped to draft did include a comprehensive section on private housing, we must assume that any reasonably perceptive reader would understand that legislation dealing with private housing was one of the "desirable features" omitted from AB-384 to the "ex-pressed regret" of Mr. Kellar and his fellowpanelists.

We also would like to point out that the article in which Mr. Kellar's disputed quote appeared also stated that a separate bill designed to prohibit discrimination in private housing was being framed for introduction at this session of the Legislature.

IT IS REGRETTABLE that complete texts of all and sundry statements made on programs such as the Rev. Walker's TV show cannot be included in newspaper reports of such programs. But omissions dictated by space limitations cannot be construed as "misquotations" or distortions if a speaker's quoted views, however briefly presented, do not conflict with the sense or import of his completely expressed views. And we cannot see where the VOICE quote attributed to Mr. Kellar distorts or conflicts with his own statement as set forth in his letter of complaint.

However, if it can be demonstrated to the satisfaction of the publisher of this newspaper that Mr. Kellar was, in fact, misquoted in the VOICE through some inexplicable happenstance, we will be only too happy to retract our version of his remarks and offer a public apology.
