## Former Rochester Teacher Returns as Top Law Official

ROCHESTER, N.Y. Almost four years ago, a young Negro from McCool, Miss., led a march on police headquarters in this upstate New York city to protest police brutality against mem-bers of his race. Next month, Laplois Ash-ford, now 29, will become one of Rochester's three top law enforcement officers.

In taking over the position of Deputy Safety Commissioner on April 5, Ashford will be the highest ranking Negro on the city payroll, with an annual salary of \$14,-531. One of two Deputy Commissioners, the onetime interscholastic track champion will deal mainly with youth problems.

Ashford was a Rochester high school teacher until 1962, when he became national youth secretary of the NAACP with headquarters in New York City, a position he will relinquish to assume his new duties. He came to Rochester from Mississippi as a child with his parents and received a degree in history from the University of Rochester before earning a master's degree in social studies at Albany State University.

A city official recalled that when Ash-ford and some of the city's other "Young Turks' left Rochester several years ago, "the youth in the community lost their best leaders. The crime rate climbed and there was a marked increase in the number of juvenile gangs.'

Mounting racial friction in Rochester reached a violent climax last July when the arrest of a Negro at a street dance by white policemen touched off a three-day disturbance. The state sent

2,500 highway troopers and 1,200 National Guardsmen to put down the rioting.

In announcing Ashford's appointment, Public Safety Commissioner Harper Sib-

ley Jr. said:
"One of the major problems and opportunities facing the City of Rochester is in the area of youth. I have been most anxious to find a person who can focus on this area, in relation to the bureaus in this department and to other governmental and private agencies in the city concerned with youth problems. Mr. Ashford is not only a nationally recognized expert on youth, but also a person who is known and respected in Rochester. I am confident he will do a good job." Ashford said he

felt his appointment was the result of the city's desire "to do something about many of the problems that are characteristic of the city's entire population and not just confined to Negroes.
