day. And that would be a shame, if nothing worse.

Ailing Pete Brown **Makes Golf History** In Rich Local Event

HISTORY WILL BE MADE in the Las Vegas area today through Sunday (April 29-May 2) when the first Negro golfer to ever qualify for the game's most exclusive pro competition competes in the 13th annual Tournament of Champions on the Desert Inn Country Club course.

Pete Brown, 30-year-old native of Jackson, Miss., won the right to play in the \$75,000 local event by winning one of the 41 official American PGA tournaments held during the past year. He finished first in the 1964 Waco Turner Open at Burneyville, Okla., with an eight-under-par 280, good for \$2,700.

No other Negro has ever won an "official" PGA circuit test over 72 holes, although Charles Sifford captured the rain-shortened 54-hole Long Beach Open in 1957 and the 72-hole Puerto Rican Open in 1963, both PGA "approved"

Only 28 golfers qualified for this year's T-C, and two of them--South Africa's Gary Player and United States Open champion Ken Venturi--were forced to withdraw for reasons beyond their control. Jack Nicklaus, only entrant to win four qualifying events for this week's tournament, including the Masters at Augusta three weeks ago, will be seeking to duplicate Gene Littler's three-year (1955-57) winning street here when he tage of at 12 noon today. streak here when he tees off at 12 noon today with Australia's Bruce Crampton.

BROWN STARTS HIS BID for the \$14,000 first prize seven minutes later at 12:07 p.m. in a twosome with Mike Souchak, the 1959 T-C winner. Pete's starting times and playing partners for Friday, Saturday and Sunday depend on how he scores in each preceding round. Saturday and Sunday play will start around 9 a.m. in order to meet TV commitments.
