Careful Planning Gets Dinner to Table on Time

Timing to have all the dishes ready at serving time is difficult for the new cook. The problem can be solved by planning things that take about the

same time to cook and placing them in the oven at the same time.

- OVEN DINNER
- Swiss Steak
- Surprise Potatoes
- Yale Beets
- Apple Pie

All of these dishes will cook in about 1 1/4 hours at the same oven setting. If desired the ingredients for a tossed salad can be prepared early in the day and

refrigerated. Toss them with your favorite dressing just before serving.

SWISS STEAK

- 1 1/2 lb. round steak, 1 1/4-in. thick
- Flour
- Salt and pepper
- Fat
- 3 med. onions, sliced
- 1 green pepper, sliced
- 1 cup tomato juice
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. chili powder

Pound flour into steak and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Brown in hot fat in skillet. Place meat in casserole and cover with onions and green pepper. Mix tomato juice, sugar and chili powder. Pour over meat and cover. Bake at 375 deg. for 1 1/4 hr. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

YALE BEETS

- 8 med. beets
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 tbsp. melted butter or margarine

Wash beets well, peel and slice. Place in casserole. Mix sugar, flour and salt. Mix orange juice, lemon juice and butter. Mix in sugar mixture. Pour over beets. Cover and bake at 375 deg. for 1 1/4 hr. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

SURPRISE POTATOES

Pare 4 to 6 medium-sized potatoes. Roll in melted butter or margarine then in cereal crumbs. Sprinkle with paprika and salt. Place in casserole. Cover and bake at 375 deg. for 1 1/4 hr. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

SOFTER, MORE FEMININE

Norell New Look Is Old Story--Perfection



Norman Norell, America's great fashion designer, is on a new wave length. He broadcasts a look that is softer and more feminine than formerly, sometimes with strict tailoring. Proportion is changed, but as always with Norell, it is perfect. There is more room at the top, fuller softer skirts. Waistlines are in full view and important. They rise and even shine with satin sashes. But the movement is always upward.

Jackets carve in at the rib cage. Following the curvy line, one of Norell's most beautiful suits turns the jacket into a cu-

taway that rises high in front and dips in back.

This jacket, with or without the cutaway effect, appears time after time. It teams with dirndl skirts and contrasting blouses, or with dresses with the fuller skirt and a fitted bodice. Black, gray, persimmon and toast in solid colors or with skirt and jacket in contrasting shades show Norell's new color theme.

Suits usually have tuck-in blouses that further accent the waistline. One of this designer's favorite blouses is double breasted with a bow at the neckline.

LONG, LEGGY LOOK

A bright blue silk crepe blouse is contrasted with a toast wool suit with short back dipping jacket.

"Though not Empire," Norell explains, "waistlines move up." Wide belts may seat themselves at the natural waistline. They also rise above it. "It gives a woman a long, leggy look," he said.

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
