

"I BELIEVE this particular 'social concern' is of crucial importance to the New Nations. Not too many Sundays ago, The New York Times magazine carried a distressing account of prejudice and racial discrimination in Africa. The article should be read carefully and considered



thoroughly. But if past experiences are indicators, the veracity of the article will be questioned by many African countries.

Most of the new nations, and not only in Africa, simply will not face up to the fact that discrimination, prejudice and injustice pervade their societies. Until these countries recognize the ills of their societies, until they are willing to admit shortcomings in this area, human rights, fundamental freedoms and dignity of the person will never be a part of the campaign of 'rising expectations,' and their national development will never reach maturity, and the basic desires of the human spirit will go forever unfulfilled. I believe that the suppression of the social sector in national development is a luxury no nation can afford no matter how impoverished.

"It is incumbent upon all nations--the new ones as they struggle for national survival and a subsistence economy, and the old as they search for formulae to narrow the gap between themselves and others--to realize that the time in which to redress the imbalance between economic growth and social development is quickly passing away. The hour is late, and the matter is urgent. I believe most nations of the world have travelled too far on this long road to redemption to turn from the path of social justice accompanying economic opportunity.


"There are forces at work in the world today which could lead us in one of two directions. There are the forces of fragmentation and of violence which could easily get out of hand and plunge us from a precarious peace into chaos. But there are also forces now in play which could take us towards peace and stability in the generation ahead," he concluded.
