School Board Deserves Commendation

WE EXTEND OUR CONGRATULATIONS to the enlightened majority on the seven-member Clark County school board that has made it possible for the local school district to give some 350 underprivileged children in this area a better chance to enter school next fall on an equal footing with their more fortunate contem-

Two weeks ago it looked like "Project Head Start," the nation-wide pre-school program for youngsters from sub-standard cultural environments, was dead in Clark County. At least for this summer. But that's all changed now, thanks to board members Chester Sewell and Walter McCall, who last week joined Dr. C. W. Woodbury and Dell Robinson to reverse the board's shocking disapproval of the program one week earlier.

As explained here last Thursday, the board's short-sighted action of May 27 came when board members Eloise Blue, Helen Cannon and George Wilkinson outvoted Dr. Woodbury and Robinson during the enforced absences of Chairman Sewell and McCall. With time a virtually important factor in properly launching the program this summer, Dr. Leland Newcomer, the superintendent of schools, and other supporters of the project figured they had a "dead horse" on their hands.

IN FACT, IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING the May 27 meeting, Dr. Newcomer and his top aide in setting up the program, Dr. Leslie Shuck, were forced to notify the 30-odd teachers and other staff members who had signed for the seven-week session starting June 28 that their services would not be needed.

"It was the only fair thing to do," Dr. Newcomer said. "Some of these people were counting on vacation employment to bolster their incomes and when it looked like the pre-school program here was dead, we had to give them a chance to make other arrangements.

However, Dr. Newcomer and Dr. Shuck failed to reckon with the determination of board members Sewell, Woodbury, Robinson and McCall to implement the program this summer with the help of \$53,131 in federal funds already allocated. (They knew the cost to the county would be practically nil.) So these gentlemen proceeded to override the Blue-Cannon-Wilkinson bloc at last week's special meeting, reinstated the program and instructed Dr. Newcomer to go through with the project even though the week's delay will make the program slightly more expensive and somewhat less effective than originally anticipated.

We are satisfied that any added expense now necessary to conduct the pre-school training program this summer is justified. And we are confident that Dr. Newcomer and Dr. Shuck will be able to reassemble a competent staff of teachers, aides, psychologists and social workers to get the job done.

MAY WE AGAIN POINT OUT that Dr. Newcomer will present several other student-aid programs, similar to "Project Head Start" in many respects, to the school board at tonight's regular meeting of that body. These programs are of especial importance to West Las Vegas

children. We suggest that as many parents as possible attend tonight's meeting, scheduled for 7:30 in the school district administrative offices at 2832 East Flamingo Rd. Dr. Newcomer and the more forward-looking members of the board are entitled to all the moral and, if necessary, vocal support they can command in their efforts to give all our Clark County children a first-class education.

As a matter of fact, it would be a good idea if all civic organizations in West Las Vegas appointed a committee of from five to ten members to attend ALL regular meetings of the school board on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month.

"Boiler Room" Operators Invade Local Carpet Field

HERE'S A WORD OF WARNING to all you new (or prospective) home owners in West Las Vegas: Beware of "carpet-bagging" carpet salesmen operating out of "boiler rooms!"

We understand this ancient con game, once

practiced with great skill by unscrupulous purveyors of phony stock, is now costing residents of this area plenty in cash and headaches. But there's one way the customer can always beat the slickers: "Before you Invest--Investigate!"

These "boiler room" operators bait the trap for unsuspecting carpet buyers with various time-tested methods. One is the newspaper ad that offers "complete, wall-to-wall" carpeting at a ridiculously low price, perhaps with one or more "bonus" articles thrown in as an additional "come-on." Since many of these 'firms' have no showrooms, the tip-off could be an invitation to call a telephone number. The other end of the line may be an answering service or a cheaply furnished "boiler room" -probably without a carpet on the floor.

Another is the girl phone solicitor with the pleasant voice. She will call you from the "boiler room" with nothing more on the table in front of her than a scratch pad, a glass of water and a long "sucker list." It is her job to open your door to the fast-talking, high-pressure salesman. In some of these operations, 75 per cent of all customer-contacts are made by the girl in the "boiler room."

Then again, your first contact with the "boiler room" gang may be through direct solicitation at your own front door. The guy or gal from the "boiler room" will be mighty persuasive. And they may even have some good-looking "samples" to show you.

Now it's true that legitimate carpet dealers also make attractive offers in newspaper ads and some use telephone and door-to-door solicitors. But just to be on the safe side, be sure you check everything carefully before you sign any papers or plunk down any of your hardearned cash. The best way to check is through the Better Business Bureau. The local office is at 318 East Charleston Blvd. and the number to call is 382-7268. These people have a list of reputable carpet concerns with whom you can safely deal.
