

Mixed Chorus Lines Predicted Here Soon; 'Ebony' Boosts Vegas

INTEGRATION OF CHORUS LINES at Las Vegas night spots in the near future was predicted by a columnist for a local daily newspaper last week.

"Tab Tabet," who conducts the SUNDial column in the Las Vegas Sun, wrote: "It's interesting to note the quiet, efficient methods by which the TV networks are 'integrating.' Network musical variety shows are integrating chorus lines in their production numbers, and national commercials are beginning to use Negro talent to help sell their sponsors' products. You can look forward to seeing the 'live' chorus lines integrated at your favorite bistro before too long!"

Another local columnist, Murray Hertz, writing in the Review-Journal, calls attention to the fact that, "The June issue of Ebony Magazine came out with what amounts to a huge nine-page spread entitled, 'Vacation in Las Vegas.'" Hertz went on to say:

"Ebony, which is undoubtedly the leading Negro publication in the United States, sent two beautiful sepia models to Las Vegas and followed them through a typical two-day jaunt through town.

"Ebony points out: Ten years ago all these attractions were off-limits to Negroes . . . The clutter of plush hostelrys along 'The Strip' now accept Negro guests and they are no longer barred in Strip or downtown casinos."

"From a human relations point of view, Las Vegas scored heavily by publication of this article. The pictures were photographed here in Las Vegas at the height of the racial furor in Selma. For years Las Vegas has been known to be a Jim Crow city. The LV News Bureau and the Strip & Casino Center hotels and casinos are to be congratulated for a fine job of improving race relations locally and certainly improving the image of Las Vegas in the eyes of the rest of the world."
