Gulfport, Biloxi and other points along the state's southern edge continue to be ahead of the state as a whole in the percentage of Negro voter registrants, in school desegregation, in public accommodation and in general amenities between the races.

The state legislature has just met to bring the state's voter registration laws in line with new federal legislation. This move was greeted with protest demonstrations by some of the more active civil rights activists. Apparently, they don't want new laws to start a new day from here on: they want to start from yesterday, with not only the old laws, but the old lawmakers wiped out.


## Another Angle of Attack

Right on the heels of the story on the Ole Miss law scholarships made possible by a Ford Foundation grant, came news from Vicksburg of the further influence of money and business on entrenched attitudes. The home of a Westinghouse plant official there was bombed, allegedly because he is opening employment to Negro secretarial applicants. Vicksburg newspapers and businessmen are fearful that Westinghouse may close its plant. More than 600 jobs and a payroll of \$3 million are involved.

Westinghouse says it is not going to endanger its half-billion-dollar defense contract with the federal government by permitting racially restricted employment poli-cies in any of its plants. When little haters run up against a multi-million-dollar payroll and a half-billiondollar contract, the winner-eventually, if not tomorrow-is easy to pick.

Geometrical progression by Mississippi in the next five years may deprive the commentators of their favorite whipping boy, but it will do more. It will doom all the sheriffs and deputy sheriffs of the Neshoba County mould and thus erase the hoodlums in these fiefdoms who have echoed in their crude way the long-dead king of France, "I am the state."





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
