Salute to Arthur

WE DOFF OUR SOMBRERO to Arthur Ashe, the 22-year-old colored youth from Richmond, Va., via UCLA, who proved the big hero of the United States-Mexico Davis Cup matches last weekend.

Ashe, first Negro to ever represent this country in the international tennis competition, measured up to his big test in the crucial opening match of the American Zone finals at Dallas on Saturday by crushing Mexico's No. 1 netman, Rafael Osuna, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, 9-7.

Osuna, a consistent victor over Ashe in tournament play during the past several years, was heavily favored to defeat his younger, less experienced rival, but the agile Virginian stunned the Mexican veteran with smashing serves and blistering passing shots. Ashe served eight aces to Osuna and broke his opponent's service five times as he dominated the match from start to finish.

After America's No. 1 player, Dennis Ralston, made it 2-0 in favor of the United States by defeating Antonio Palafox, Ashe again found himself on the spot in Monday's first singles match following Sunday's doubles, which saw Osuna and 'Palafox put Mexico back in the running with a straight set victory over Ralston and Ham Richardson.

But Ashe again was equal to the challenge by overwhelming Palafax, 6-1, 6-4, 6-4, to send the United States into the inter-zone playoff against Spain at Barcelona later this month. The winner of that match will get a crack at Australia for the "world championship."
