PLANS TO COMBAT organized efforts to have the Las Vegas city commission reconsider its ultimatum to the management of Juleart Trailer Park to evacuate all occupants of the "H" St. and Owens Ave. court by Aug. 31 will be discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the Las Vegas NAACP next Sunday, Aug. 8, 3 p.m., at Kit Carson School.

Spearheading the drive to keep the court in operation for a minimum period of 45 days be-

yond the Aug. 31 deadline was a Catholic Welfare group led by Bro. George Barton of St. James Catholic Church.

Opposing further concessions to the park management and its tenants is the Housing Committee of the Las Vegas NAACP, which has led the fight to close down the operation following repeated protests by residents of the adjoining Berkeley Square housing development that the park was an "eyesore" and served to depreciate property values in the neighborhood.

Housing committee chairman Frank Anderson pointed out that the park has been cited for numerous violations of the city trailer code over a period of many years. He also stated that Juleart tenants, many of whom claim they cannot afford other accommodations, are entitled to priority in the new low-cost housing complex at Lake Mead Blvd. and Highland Dr.

Attempts by the Juleart management to obtain code variances so the park could stay in business were unsuccessful and the Aug. 31 closure order followed.

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
