THE GREAT COMPANION

Text: "I Will Not Leave You Comfortless; I Will Come to You." (John 14:18)

IS IT A FACT that we can KNOW Jesus of Nazareth just as we know our earthly friends? do not mean following His example or benefitting from His ideas. Nor do I mean drawing a picture of Him. What I mean is -- can we KNOW Jesus -- talk with Him, feel His presence and friendship with us in our daily lives? If this is so, here is a tremendous fact which the average Christian has not grasped almost 2,000 years after it was established by Christ himself.

When Dr. Dale was working on his book, "The Living Christ and the Four Gospels," he suddenly leaped to his feet and started pacing

the floor in excitement. "Jesus Christ is alive!" he cried, "Jesus Christ is alive!" A Christian, theologian and a Bible student all his life, Dr. Dale still had not come to the Great Realization until that late date.

To the ancient Jews, God had always appeared as a Friend. Enoch walked with God."--"God spoke to Moses."--Abraham was called "the friend of God." Jesus, the revelation of the Father, was the con-

summation of this concept.

Jesus was not unapproachable. He did not even wait for men to come to Him. He went to them. He was never too busy to listen to the problems of others. He was friendly and sympathetic to all--the rich and the poor, Gentile or Jew. And when He died on the Cross, was that the end? Of course not! He devoted a great deal of time and effort in those last days trying to get across to His disciples that he would be with them forever, literally and irrevocably. "I will not leave you comfortless. I will come

ONE OF THE BIBLE'S most beautiful revelations is the way in which Jesus strove to demonstrate this fact after His resurrection. Jesus would not let Mary touch him. Why? Because He wanted her to accept His presence on faith alone. He wanted to emphasize that His presence is not dependent on sight or touch. The same thing was true of the other post-resurrection

appearances. In his "Transforming Friendship," Leslie Weatherhead writes, "Two men are on their way to Emmaus. Suddenly, without hearing anything, they find a Companion by their side. He walks with them, talks with them, sits with them at the table. They recognize Him by the way He breaks a loaf, and then He is gone. The Twelve are gathered in an upper room. Suddenly they are aware of a Presence. He is there. There is a word of peace. He is gone. Again on the seashore. Again on a mountain in Galilee. Again

near Bethany.

"What do these strange appearings and disappearings mean? They are His perfect way of making them feel that He is never far away. He does not seem to be there. Then He breaks in upon them, always knows what has happened, always takes charge of the situation, until they never know when they may be aware of Him. They stopped midway in a sentence because they remembered that He could not be far away, and perhaps was an invisible auditor. The experience becomes richer. They feel that He is never absent. Communion will now mean as much as it did when they could hear His voice, see His face, and touch Him. They do not need the aid of eye and ear and hand. He has carried friendship beyond death. The Ascension does not mean that He passed to some distant heaven beyond those possibilities of friendship, but that He widened the possibilities so that for all men He is the ever-available. And Pentecost was not for them, I think, the coming of a third person, but Jesus, present in an overwhelming

sense as their Friend, back in their midst in power indescribable.'

This realization is like a breath of fresh, fragrant air relieving the nauseous odor of decaying garbage.

And here is a home torn by jealousy and suspicion and incompatability. Parents exchange bitter recriminations. Children become accustomed to harsh words or worse and are soon wrangling among themselves. Love and understanding seem dead. But suppose a mutual friendship is somehow established between the husband and wife and the Great Companion. They suddenly are ashamed to realize that He hears and sees everything that has been going on. Now that they have One to whom they can take their problems, the entire family may soon find peace and harmony in the realization of a great Friend-

Or here is a woman who has lived a selfish and self-centered existence. She measures everything that happens by one rule--"How does this affect ME?" Then comes the time when her aged father dies. She cries out in anguish, "Why had God done this to me?" If this woman knew Jesus as a Friend, she would be able to accept the inevitable with tranquility. She would realize that her father had gone on to closer friendship with Jesus and she herself could find consolation in that same friendship here on earth.

"The love of Jesus, what it is, None but His loved ones know.

Yes, my friends, they KNOW! And if YOU truly love Jesus, there can be no doubt that you will find Him at your side--the Great Companion--ever ready to comfort and guide you.
