DEE DEE LYNN, the former professional dancer who recently opened the School of Per-forming Arts at 815 W. Owens Ave., started her career at the age of three when she was enrolled in the Peter Pan Dance School, New York City.

She later studied for five years at the Katherine Dunham School and with Mabel Horsey at the CBS Studios in New York, in addition to attending ballet classes directed by Irene Hawthorne, premier danseuse of the Metropolitan

Opera Co., and tap dance classes conducted by the highly regarded Oliver McCook. Miss Lynn organized her own dance act, known as "Dee Dee and Reggie;" was a featured performer with the Charlie Atkins group and worked such well-known spots as the Apollo Theatre, New York; The Flame, Detroit, and the Cotton Club, Miami, Fla.

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less trouble they can cause elsewhere."

Nyerere's attitude toward the Congo has also been a source of irritation to the West, which believes Premier Moise Tshombe's task is delicate enough without the little Tanzanian's gratuitous attacks. Arms shipments across Lake Tanganyika are now the only supply line left open to Congo rebel forces, which the Dares-Salaam press continues to call "nationalists."

APOLOGISTS FOR NYERERE again protest his sincerity in fighting against any compromise with colonialism.

"He really believes in what a lot of Africans are dismissing as impractical," a sympathiz-ing diplomat said. "Most of the Africans are just talking and they have no money to contribute to Julius' freedom fighters.

"Tshombe's sin in Nyerere's eyes was to stop active support of the nationalist rebellion in Angola, leaving the Portuguese free to concentrate on wiping out the rebels in Mozambi-que on this side of Africa," the diplomat explained.

Ironically, Tshombe's government is one of only five among the 36 members of the Organization of African Unity paying their share of the cost of training guerrilla fighters in Dar-es-Salaam. Nyerere ignores this gesture of support for his own aims.

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
