the only method of discovering patterns of discrimination. They argued that resolution of individual complaints is not an effective way to attack the broad problem of employment discrimination. Others maintained that we must now, in fact, be conscious of color rather than color blind.

It was argued also that those persons disposed to discriminate would do so regardless of the existence of written records and that the "head count" method of compiling data had proved inaccurate, disruptive, and expensive to employers. One panelist suggested that employers keeping these records would become more aware of their own deficiencies in providing equal employment opportunity, and that the

purpose of keeping a record is important, not the fact that the record is kept; a color designation will provide something substantial to work with, a basis for finding patterns of discrimination, a tool for achieving equality.

One participant proposed consolidation of the President's Committee with the EEO Commission, including the consolidation of report

systems and personnel.

There was general agreement on a statement by one of the participants that whatever the final form of reporting decided upon, it should be used consistently; that is, not changed every year.

Another controversial point covered was whether unions should be required to keep records and make reports if they had more than 100 employees. The Commission staff had proposed only to cover hiring hall situations and apprentice programs, but several conferees felt that unions, especially if Section 14B is repealed, should be covered because they will have considerable control over hiring situations. Union representatives, however, contended that except for building trade unions, few unions have control over hiring. Employer representatives suggested it was the intent of Congress to cover labor unions as well as other groups; that to comply with the law will require expenditure of many man hours and money by industry, and labor should not be exempted.
