Expressing pardonable pride in his staff, Mr. Kelly stated he was particularly impressed with first grade teacher, Muriel A. Milne's views on the subject, and passed them along to the VOICE readers.

MY AIMS FOR THE YEAR 1965-1966

First, I hope to help each child to attain the greatest excellence possible in academic development.

In so doing, a child must learn to be comfortable, at least in some measure, in the world in which he finds himself. To lead him to accomplish this, it is my duty to teach him to feel the power and potential with which he has been endowed, to become aware of his responsibilities of attention to his health; of necessity for making decisions, for developing good work habits; for thinking clearly and realistically; and responsibility for being fair and considerate of others. I wish each child to feel the dignity

of his own being and the dignity of his associates. But, more than this, each child should be helped to discover something that will help sustain him throughout life in times of stress and confusion. I want to help each one to find beauty delight in his immediate world; sunrise andmoonset; the flight and song of a bird; the dream in music; the wealth of a smile and laughter; the loyalty of a pet; the gentleness of friendship; and many other simple close experiences that can give shape and meaning to life.

My methods of realizing such important and difficult aims must be related to gaining the child's confidence quite completely. If such confidence can be captured, a teacher can instill love of learning and desire for exploration and discovery and develop the child's natural bent for wonder and creativity. Above all, I hope to teach the child that a mistake is never final, that he must never be devastated because of error since errors can be corrected or, if not, new and better attack of problems at hand may be discovered.
