

when they think of becoming Christians. They must ask, "Now which church shall join?"

Just what are the causes of all these divisions in Christendom? The causes are many but we shall consider only a few. One cause for division is racial differences. Suppose a person of another race came in to worship with you? Would you accept him? In some places colored persons are not allowed in churches attended by white people. N.B. Madden, 50 year veteran missionary to Japan, said the racial barrier was his hardest problem to overcome in his work with the Japanese. The truth of the matter is that underneath the skin every person's soul is the same. There is no respecting of persons with God. Paul writes in Romans 1:16 that the Gospel "is the power of God unto salvation, to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."

ANOTHER CAUSE of division is social differences. Whether we like to admit it here in America or not, money produces a distinct class barrier. In a conversation with a minister of a faith different from my own in which we discussed the various differences between us, he made the remark that his church catered more to a better class of people.

A third cause of division is personal ambition. Too often preachers desire to be bosses and overlords of the congregations. In no place in God's Word are they given such authority. It is the business of the elders, or bishops of the local congregations to supervise but not "lording it over."

Other primary causes of division are jealousy hatred and envy. When men can't get along with one another in love, then the Christian Spirit is not within them and division results. If divisions are to be healed or prevented, it must be done on the basis of the Word of God.

DIVISION OF CHRISTIANITY must cease if God's Will is to be carried out. The sin of faction and division is frequently denounced in the New Testament. In several places it is listed with murders, idolatry, adultery, etc. Paul says in I Corinthians 1:10: "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

Unity can only be achieved in Christ Jesus. It was Jesus' prayer in John 17, that "they (believers) all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us; that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." His prayer was that ALL BELIEVERS might be of the same Mind, and the same Spirit, and of the same Body. The Mind is the Mind of Christ; the Body is the Body of Christ of which He is the Head; the Spirit is the Divine Spirit which animates the Body.

IF SUCH PERFECT UNITY is to be realized, all must accept God as the Divine Creator and Sustainer, a wise and loving Father to all His children. All must accept the bible as the ditaking it as the sole rule of faith and practice. All must believe that Jesus is the Christ, the divine Son of God, the Head of His Body, the Church. The name Christian can be worn by all the followers of Christ, which name is divinely given in Acts 11:26. The divine mission was to make Christians, to win souls to Jesus Christ, not to seek "joiners" for a particular denomination.

Let us strive therefore, with all the power that is within us to end all divisions and strifes and come to a divine unity in which we are all one in Christ Jesus.



Considering the division in the world, one might begin with the home. The rate of juvenile crime is soaring upward and upward. The newspapers are filled with accounts of young children in criminal activities. The penitentiaries are filled to capacity with hardened criminals of teen age or in their early twenties. Why is this true? Investigation has shown that there is a definite relationship between the increased juvenile crime rate and the national divorce rate increase. Thousands of homes are divided each year over trivial disagreements or a flare of uncontrolled animal instinct that causes people to leave their mates and families seeking satisfaction in immorality.

Is it any wonder children turn to crime and worldly vices? Frustrated and unhappy, they are forced to make a choice between mother and father. With this unforgettable mental torture and without adequate parental love and guidance, the children are cast to the mercy of the world. Division in the home takes a deadly toll!
