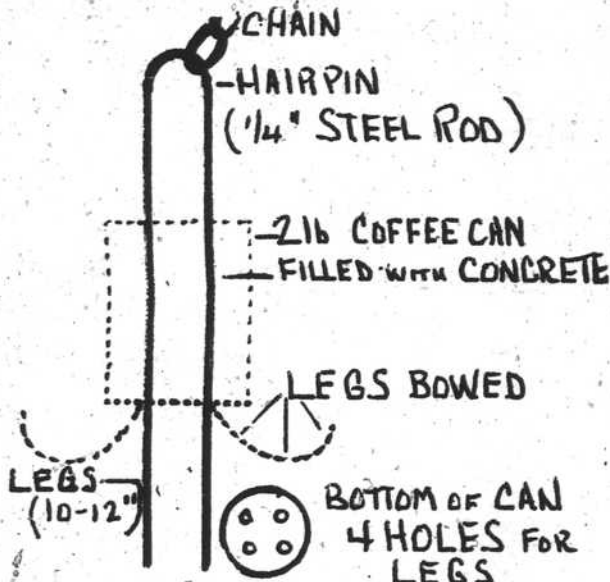

"The Crappie Catcher" INFORMATION

THE MOST POPULAR ANCHOR for these waters is the "do it yourself" kind. It is a very simple, as well as economical, thing to make. For about 3 or 4 dollars you can purchase enough material to make 3 or 4 anchors. O'Neill Lumber Co. on W. Bonanza can supply all necessary materials. You will need a sack of ready-mixed dry concrete, some 1/4 inch construction steel, heavy chain, and a few empty tin cans (the 2-lb. coffee can is the ideal size).



CUT THE STEEL RODS into 5-foot lengths. Bend the 5-foot pieces around a 1-inch pipe to shape them into hairpins as illustrated. You will use two of these hairpins for each anchor. Slip the straight leg of the hairpin through the loop at the end of your 6-foot chain and pull the chain loop up to the bend in the steel rods.

POSITION THE 4 LEGS of the two hairpins so that the ends of the four legs make a square box. Place the 4 legs in the bottom of your 2-lb. coffee can and mark the position of each leg-- then punch 4 holes at the marked positions in the bottom of the can. Push the 4 legs through the 4 holes, leaving about 10 to 12 inches of the steel projecting through the bottom of the can. The can should be set up on the edges of two boxes placed close together so that the 4 legs hang down between the boxes.

With the can and legs (10-12 inches below bottom of can) so situated, center the tops of the two hairpins in the open end of the can and fill the can with the concrete. Allow enough time for the concrete to harden (about 12 hours).

AFTER THE CONCRETE SETS, bend each of the 4 legs out so that you now have a 4-pronged anchor. Each of the 4 prongs should be bent outward from the can so that they form a bow with the ends of the prongs pointing upward toward the top of the can. You will then have a cheap anchor which will do a better job than anything you can buy.

When this anchor gets hung in the rocks, you can free it by taking up all the slack in your line, fastening the line securely to a cleat and pulling it loose by circling the anchor under power of your motor. The 1/4-inch steel will bend under this power and free the anchor. After pulling anchor, reshape the straightened prongs by bending them back into their proper bowed shape with ends pointing upward.

Henderson has sported a 9-0 record, while the Matt Kelly team has a 13-0 record.



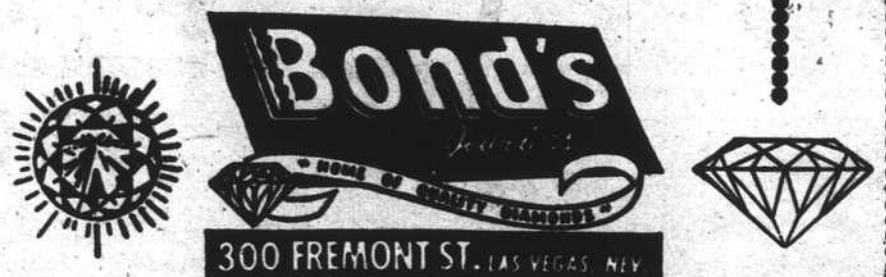
