MORE JOB TRAINING COURSES OFFERED

RECRUITMENT IS CURRENTLY underway for an Automatic Transmission Mechanic training course, with classes scheduled to start December 13. Trainees for two courses in Basic Education will be sought beginning December 13. The Education courses are scheduled to start January 1, 1966. One course is listed as clerical, and is open to those of age 22 and up; the other is a Youth Basic Education course and is programed for youths between the ages of 17 and 22.

The vocational education courses, sponsored jointly by the Nevada State Department of Vocational Education and the Nevada Employment Security Department, are offered under the auspices of the Manpower Development and Train-

Because all training courses are based on the needs within individual communities, Las Vegans wishing to upgrade their earning capacity and increase their employability, would do well to check with the local Manpower Development and Training agency about the numerous training courses offered, and take advantage of counseling aid to select the class for training in the specific field determined to develop individual potential.

Recent training courses completed have included such diversified classes, as Office Practices, 52 weeks; Data Processing (Programmer), 45 weeks; Duplicating Machine Operator, 52 weeks; Upholsterer, 52 weeks; Auto Service Station Attendant, Janitorial and Automatic Transmission Mechanic classes.

SOON TO BE ANNOUNCED are recruiting dates for Nurseryman and Front Office Cashier training courses.


