NEVADANS CONSTANTLY HEAR talk of "growth and development." However, these terms are hazy unless supported by specific facts from reliable sources.

When we tell of progress in manufacturing, we have ample facts and they are supported by the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

The first interesting fact is that Nevada, oriented for many years solely to a tourist economy, has become the national leader in new manufacturing firms. Between 1958 and 1963, Nevada's increase in manufacturing firms was 37.6 percent. This was 14 times the national average of 2.7 percent during the same period.

There were 10 states, including one in the West, that showed a decline.

ANOTHER INDICATOR of Nevada's growth is the 38.4 percent increase of manufacturing, employees, placing the state in third spot among the western states. The national average increase was 5.9 percent.

In terms of manufacturing payroll, Nevada increased its dollar total by 60.5 percent, again third highest among the western states. The Bureau of the Census reported that the national average for manufacturing payroll growth in this period was 26.9 percent, while the average for the 11 western states was 39.9 percent, both farebelow Nevada's average.

Finally, there is the category termed "value added," which is the increased value of goods produced and services rendered by employees to the general public. Nevada climbed 65.3 percent in the six-year period. This percentage resulted from a climb from \$67,591 million to \$111,733 million in value added, through an increased amount of goods produced, and increased total of wages to employees rendering service to the general public.

THIS MANUFACTURING GROWTH has not simply occurred without rhyme or reason. It has happened in Nevada because our state offers numerous advantages for manufacturing, including a favorable tax base, an efficient labor force and ample land. Hundreds of persons, in cooperation with the State Department of Economic Development, are working to bring new industry to Nevada and to publicize the state's advantages.

If the enthusiasm for such self-promoting work continues, in the years to come, Nevada can expect to experience continued orderly growth that will benefit us all.

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Negro Appointments

DR. THEODORE R. FREEMAN JR., formerly an associate county extension agent of Angelina County, Texas, and Fr. Robert L. Hurst, professor of agricultural economics at South Carolina State College, both Ph.Ds, have been appointed to important foreign trade posts in the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Dr. Freeman has been named as an agricultural economist on the export programs staff of Foreign Agricultural Service, and Dr. Hurst chief of the special studies branch of that agency's sugar and tropical products division.

In his position, Dr. Freeman helps to provide follow-through in the export of food and fiber to developing countries under the Foodfor Peace Program. This involves an accounting of commodities shipped to these countries, and a general overseeing of compliance with the terms of Food for Peace agreements between the United States and other countries.

Currently, 41 countries have such agreements with the U.S. These agreements enable the countries to purchase American farm commodities with their own currencies. Among these countries are India, Pakistan, Ethiopia, Kenya, the Republic of the Congo, Yugoslavia and Brazil.

Dr. Freeman has returned from his first inspection trip to South America where he visited Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, and Peru.

Dr. Hurst is concerned mainly with worldwide data on supply, demand availability, and prices of products such as sugar, coffee, cocoa, and tea which are imported by the United States either because the country does not grow them or does not produce them in sufficient quantity to meet its needs.

Maintenance of economic data on these products is of major importance to American consumers. Coffee imports, for example, amount to approximately a billion dollars a year, and sugar imports -- some 40 percent of the country's requirements -- total \$500 million'a year.
