## Straight From The Hon. Senator's Desk

WASHINGTON--The Air Force is expected to ask Congress for nearly \$1 million to finance its construction projects at Nellis Air Force Base in the next fiscal year, Nevada Senator Howard W. Cannon said today.

The fiscal year 1967 construction program includes a \$445,000 flight simulator training installation; \$227,000 for field training facility and \$265,000 for various shops to work on aircraft engine inspection and repair as well as armaments and electrical alterations.

CANNON, A MEMBER of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said the requests are being reviewed by the Bureau of the Budget preparatory to its being sent to the Committee.

The Nevada Senator pointed out that the request does not include the regular multi-million dollar appropriation for the annual operations of the desert base.

WASHINGTON--The record blood donation for our Viet Nam servicemen made recently by students of the University of Nevada should serve as a tremendous morale booster for U.S. forces throughout Southeast Asia, Nevada Senator Howard W. Cannon said today.

Cannon, who has frequently expressed concern for the morale effect on U.S. forces because of student demonstrations, was notified of the donations by University President C. J. Armstrong.

The senator, who recently visited South Viet Nam said the blood donor program was a "real tribute to the students and to the educational system" and called their response "unselfish and spontaneous."

"By their act they have demonstrated what

the vast majority of Americans already know--that the country is behind our efforts to preserve the freedom of Viet Nam and to do what we must to stem the tide of Communism in Asia," Cannon said.

He told President Armstrong, "I hope that the example of the students becomes a guideline for Americans in all walks of life in recognizing responsibility for and appreciation of the sacrifices being made by our men in Viet Nam."

WASHINGTON--Outstanding Nevada high school graduates who will enter college in September and selected college students now in their second year of the four-year Army ROTC program are eligible for Army ROTC scholarships, Sen. Howard W. Cannon said today.

Cannon stated the scholarships are authorized under the ROTC Vitalization Act of 1964. The first scholarships under the program were awarded last July and became effective during the present school year.

Three Nevada students were awarded scholarships during the first year of the program.

Cannon said the scholarships finance tuition, textbooks and laboratory fees and provide a \$50-a-month subsistence allowance for the duration of the award--either two or four years.

APPLICATIONS FOR THE program must be made between Jan. 15 and March 1. Nevada students must apply to the Commanding General, Sixth United States Army, Presidio of San Francisco, California.

Nearly 250 colleges and universities in the United States conduct Army ROTC programs which produce more than 10,000 new second lieutenants for the active Army each year.
