"The Crappie Catcher" INFORMATION

HOW MANY TIMES have you seen a fellow fisherman pulled-up on the side of the road with his boat trailer broken-down? Nine times out of ten the breakdown is the result of a burned wheel bearing on the boat trailer. If you have been a witness to this sad situation just once, it should be a cause for personal concern.

If you have never been the victim of a breakdown on one of those long stretches of uninhabited desert highway, you have either been darn lucky, or extremely careful about the care of your wheel bearings.

The expense of a breakdown in the middle of nowhere adds up to a lot of loot, not to mention the cost factor on your nervous system which by itself runs pretty high. The towing bill alone runs a buck a mile, unless it happens in the middle of the night, or on a week-end or on a holiday. Then the union says a buck fifty, or maybe a deuce a mile. As fate would have it, you are most likely to experience this disaster when the rates are double.

AFTER SPENDING several frustrating hours trying to flag-down some sympathetic motorist, if you are lucky enough to have just one such good samaritan come along, you will swear that you will take all necessary steps to prevent this inconvenience ever again.

The bearing problem is not an exclusive liability of your boat trailer. It is just as likely to happen to your car or truck. When the trouble does happen with your vehicle, it is far more costly to repair.

When you load, or unload your boat, and have to back your rear-end under water, you get sludge and water into your rear-end as well as into your brake drums. This can, and eventually will, cause damage that will run into a repair bill that will be sure to make you lose your cool.

The sludge that gets into the brakes will wear the linings and cut deep ridges into the drums. The water in the rear end will rust the ring and pinion gears, the axles, and the bearings. The cost of replacing all of these damaged parts is out of sight, and does not represent anything near the total costs. The loss of the use of your vehicle, while it is being repaired, represents more expense, not to mention the inconvenience of being without wheels for a few days. If you add these costs to the price of the wear and tear on your nerves, when you lose your cool after being stranded in the middle of the desert for hours, as car after car passes you by just like you were just another cactus plant, the total is just too much.

The thought of the inconvenience, as well as the expense involved, is a just cause to either give you nightmares, or cause your little woman to raise enough Cain to make you wish you were still stranded on the road where you couldn't hear her trap snapping at you.
