said. "But on the home front Congress will be reluctant and in some instances opposed to launching any massive new program.

After setting a record of achievement in its first session, Bible said, the 89th Congress will refine and apply its work and "avoid going too far, too fast.

CONGRESS WILL have to balance our growing burdens abroad against our needs and prob-lems at home," the Nevada Senator said. "After cutting taxes in two successive years it will not want to raise taxes.'

Bible announced his support of several Presidential proposals, including increased crime prevention and highway safety, stiffened laws against currupt political campaign practices, improved income tax withholding practices and a four-year term for Congressmen.

But he said he would continue to oppose legislation to nullify state right-to-work laws and any tax increase "unless absulutely essential."

Bible said he hesitated to comment on the President's fiscal proposals until the Executive Budget is available to Congress.

WASHINGTON--Senator Alan Bible of Nevada was among more than 40 senators joining in sponsorship this week of a resolution aimed at halting the spread of nuclear weapons.

The resulution supports "urgent and serious efforts" by the President to Negotiate international agreements to limit nuclear prolifer-

ation.

"Nuclear capability is fast coming within the reach of more and more nations," Bible said.

"As the number of countries arming themselves with atomic weapons increases, the danger of irresponsible use increases -- and with this, there is the inevitable increase in the threat of world wide holocaust.'

BIBLE SAID it is essential to preserve control and responsibility "or the day can come when irrational despots can blackmail mankind

with a nuclear trigger finger."

The resolution, he added, is more than an expression of interest by the Senate.

"It is an instrument which can immeasurably strengthen and guide the President in this vital area," Bible declared.

WASHINGTON--Senator Alan Bible said today the Bureau of Reclamation's budget request includes \$26.2 million for projects wholly or partly within Nevada, a \$10 million increase over the current fiscal year.

Most of the increase, Bible said, is for construction in Nevada on the Pacific Northwest-Pacific Southwest Power Intertie, the Boulder



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Project. The Nevada Senator emphasized the total did not include funds for the Southern Nevada Water Project, authorized late in 1965, which will be sought separately.

BIBLE SAID \$8.9 million is budgeted for the federal portion of the intertie, a direct-current transmission line running from the Oregon border to Hoover Dam. Initial work on this line in

the current year totals \$3.2 million. Some \$2.2 million requested for the Washoe Project, Bible said, will continue construction of Stampede Dam on the Little Truckee River and finance pre-construction planning for Watasheamu Dam on the North Fork of the Carson River. It is an increase of \$1.5 million over current spending.


Bible said the Bureau requests \$1.7 million in the Boulder Canyon Project for constructing reservoir and pipeline facilities connecting with Boulder City's water system.

Other reclamation budget requests listed by Bible included: General Investigations--Moapa Valley Pumping Project, Clark County, \$100,-000; ultimate phase of Washoe Project, \$85,928; Inland Basins Project, Nevada-California,

OPERATION AND maintenance -- Boulder Canyon Project, \$2.1 million; Colorado River front work, \$5.1 million; Parker-Davis Project, 3.4 million; Washoe Project, \$12,500.

General Administration, \$729,550.

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
