DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. . . A retired mail clerk, who took time out between runs to make "wise" investments in Jacksonville real estate, has given \$50,000 to Bethune-Cookman College, Dr. Richard V. Moore, president, reported.

The donor, Peter H. Robinson, specified that the money he used toward the construction of a \$250,000 music building on the campus, which will be named the "Julia E. Robinson Memorial Music Hall" in tribute to his wife.

Robinson was here to meet with B-CC students, staff and friends, and to present his check to Dr. Moore. He also unveiled an artist's rend-

ering of the proposed building.

Ground for the new building will be broken in September, about the time three other new buildings on the campus now under construction are to be dedicated, Dr. Moore reported.

BORN IN PENSACOLA, Robinson studied for

a year at the Tuskegee Institute and worked for two years in Memphis as a carpenter before taking the Civil Service Examination for mail

For more than 33 years he worked as a mail clerk on the Seaboard Airlines Railroad between Jacksonville and Pensacola. He is an outstanding layman at Ebenezer Methodist Church, Jackson-

Robinson's wife, though not a B-CC alumna, knew of the college's work through her membership on the United Negro College Fund in Jacksonville and she visited the school and supported its efforts often, according to Dr. Moore.

Her husband's gift is believed by Dr. Moore to be the largest gift to a Negro college by a Negro in the state. Dr. Moore said a drive to raise the remaining \$200,000 needed to build and furnish the music hall will begin immediately.

Preliminary plans for the 11,000 square foot building call for 10 practice rooms, five office studios, a large band and choral room, a smaller choral room, a lounge and music libraries.

A TENTATIVE SITE for the building has been selected behind the new men's dormitory now under construction. To be of brick and masonry construction, the hall will be sound-proofed.

Other buildings, beside the dormitory, now under construction on the B-CC campus are a science building and a student service center. Cost of the three buildings is about \$1,500,000, with about \$600,00 of this coming from federal sources.


