

MOST IMPRESSIVE OF EASTER **OBSERVANCES HELD IN GREECE**

Of the four regular occasions when the King of Greece rides through the streets of Athens in his full glory, Easter is the most colorful.

This most ornate procession, winding throughout the downtown streets of Athens, lasts for nearly two hours. Light is provided by flaming torches and tiny candles held by the thousands who line the route of the procession.

On the stroke of midnight, comes the procla-mation--"CHRIST IS RISEN", after which the multitude of voices are raised in the Hymn of the

Resurrection. Then with the practice of centuries of tradition, everyone suddenly produces a hard boiled egg which has been dyed a dull red color, cracks it with that of his neighbor and eats it. This ceremony with the egg is done on the streets, or can be seen in any church in Greece --but many go to the Cathedral, where the EDDYE K. KIM King performs the ancient custom by cracking



eggs with the Archbishop. To complete the Greek Easter Celebration, one must carry a candle home without it going out. If if should flicker out, use of a match to relight it is taboo; the light is rekindled from the candle of a passer-by. According to belief, once you have crossed your threshold with candle lit, good fortune is yours for the coming year.

EASTER IN LAS VEGAS ...
