A PICTORIAL HISTORY OF THE NEGRO IN AMERICA, by Langston Hughes and Milton Meltzer. New revised edition. Crown Publishers, Inc., New York. 335 pages. 1963. \$5.95. Sixth

Here, for the first time, is an authoritative, panoramic picture story of the Negro in America, from the arrival of the first African slave ship to present times, covering every aspect of Negro life--social, political, artistic and economic. This unique book, lavishly illustrated with more than 1,000 reproductions of pictures, paintings, broadsides, drawings, woodcuts and cartoons, contains concise pictorial accounts of all the important events in the Negro's dramatic struggle for freedom. There are pictures of every famous and important Negro from Nat Turner, Frederick Douglass and Dred Scott to modern leaders such as Adam Clayton Powell, the Reverend Martin Luther King and Ralph Bunche.

BUT THIS BOOK IS FAR MORE than a collection of pictures—fascinating as they are. Beginning with the ori-

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gins of the Negro in Africa, the authors trace in text and picture the story of the Negro as a slave and as a freeman, who he is, where he came from, what he has contributed, how he has affected and, in turn, has been affected by American life and, finally, where he is headed. Included in this absorbing account are reproductions of news editor-

ials, letters, posters, handbills and pamphlets ranging from the early days of the slave trade to the recent desegregation decision of the Supreme Court.

These extraordinary varied illustrations constitute the largest number and the most important pictures of Negro history ever assembled in one volume. Portraying every facet of the role of the Negro in American history, they were selected from the many thousands in Milton Meltzer's and Langston Hughes' personal collections as well as from public and private sources throughout the world.

YEARS OF STUDY AND RESEARCH went into the preparation of this volume and because of the authors' happy blend of sound scholarship and clear narrative style, the reader gains from these pages a remarkable understanding of the great dramatic background, the rich heritage and the unquenchable spirit of the Negro people.

LANGSTON HUGHES is often called the poet laureate of the Negro people. His works have been read and loved by people the world over. His works also include novels, short stories, history, biography, autobiography, plays, lyrics for opera and musical comedy, and the enormously popular humorous sketches about that talkative character, Simple.

MILTON MELTZER is a specialist in graphic history and biography. He is also a science writer and editor who has written for radio, television, newspapers and magazines. Mr. Meltzer is the author of MARK TWAIN HIMSELF, MILESTONES TO AMERICAN LIBERTY, and co-author of A THOREAU PROFILE.

This is a superb book which should be in every school library as well as every Negro man's home.
