FOLLOWING ARE HELPFUL SUGGESTIONS for the Bride-to-be for a successful wedding. (1) Look for your wedding dress the day after


you say "yes". Order invitations two months in advance. Attend to everything as early as you can, so that last-minute crises find you able to cope.



" 'A Wider World Ministry' is what I am hoping for. One of the things that helped sustain me during the long winter months, was the thought of everything I could learn and see were I to be elected as a delegate to the World Family Conference to be held in London, England in August, this year. I am happy and grateful that I was elected and will be attending the Conference". These were the words of Rev. Marion Bennett, one of the City's most distinguished ministers and citizens.

The objective of the Conference is the conception of a base for a wider ministry of the world by establishing a Center of Worship which would cut across all lines of race, culture, class, creed, or religion.

A DEEP AND ABIDING motivation guided Rev. Bennett through his secondary schooling at Sterling High School in Greenville, South Carolina and throughout his training at the Morris Brown College in Atlanta, Georgia where he obtained an A.B. degree. He served as Student Body President at Atlanta's Interdenominational Theological Center from which he earned a B.D. degree. It was there that he became a leader in the Atlanta Sit-In demonstrations.

The Rev. Bennett has also done Advance Studies at Atlanta University and Nevada Southern U.

Among the religious posts he has held are included the pastorship of Wesley Methodist Church, York, So. Carolina, Summer Evangelist at Boulevard Temple, Detroit, Michigan, and at Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa. He is presently Pastor of the Zion Methodist Church here in Las Vegas.

In his community, he is Chaplain for the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, NAACP President, Co-Chairman of the OJT Opportunity Council, Advisory Board Member of the Youth Opportunity Center, and member of the Clark County Ministerial Association.

Rev. Bennett is married and he and his devoted spouse, Gwendolyn have a four-year-old daughter who will make the trip to England this summer with her parents.
