THE DIGNITY OF MAN

Text: "What is man that thou art mindful of him?" Ps. 8:4.

Irreligion causes the loss of human dignity. There are those "who are perplexed by the con-sequences of their own irreligion"; who "have lost certainty that their lives are significant.'

The Christian religion gives men dignity, worth, significance. Human dignity is at the very heart of the Gospel of Christ.

Man has the dignity given by God's hand. By, God's hand we mean God's creative power. "God created man in His own image." This is man's basic and essential dignity. The nature of the creative process matters not. The intrinsic value of man, any man, is that he is made in the image of God. Intrinsic value is value determined

by inherent hature.
"What is man?" cried the Psalmist, "thou has made him little less than God.

How wonderfully is he made! He has the dignity of erect stature. Born in a moment he can grow through a lifetime. Man can think, reason,

He can love and receive love. His heart has no bounds, except by his own deciding. A man can love his brothers in the world. He can love God. The mind and the heart of man give him dignity: MAN HAS THE dig-

WORKERS FOR HEALTH PROGRAM SOUGHT

The Nevada Division of Health has been designated as the agency in Nevada towork with the Social Security Administration in the Implementation of the Home Benefits portion of Title 18, Social Security Amendments of 1965.

The obligation of the State Health Division is to the identification of areas in the state where Home Health Services are unavailable or inadequate; to provide assistance to both existing agencies to upgrade services to meet certification requirements. To provide funds and other assistance to make Home Health Services available in areas where they are not now available, either by expanding existing agencies or assisting in the development of new organizations; and to provide funds to existing agencies to assist in meeting certification by hiring additional staff and to improve services by means of orientation and refresher courses.

There are three organized public health agencies in the state providing skilled nursing service. . .the City and County Health Department of Washoe County, the Clark County District Health Department, and the Section of Public Health Nursing in the State Division of Health, which provides public health nursing coverage for the 15 rural counties.

Today we are faced with a large and evergrowing number of persons of advanced age. In Nevada, there are approximately 31,275 persons over 65 years of age. Forty-two percent of these (13,275) are located in Clark County, thirty-two percent (10,136) are located in Washoe County, while the remaining 26% (7,864) are distributed throughout the state.

THE PURPOSE of the Home Health Nurses is to serve the chronically ill at home, who more often than not, fall into this age bracket. It is because of the increasing number of patients with chronic diseases (that the hospitals cannot take care of) that Home Nursing Care Programs are accepted as one of the most useful methods in the long medical management of the chronically ill. Many of these patients do not need or require the full range of hospital services.

There are approximately 1,500 professional nurses registered and living within the state, with about 30% currently unemployed. Since this group of unemployed nurses is in the 25-35 year age bracket, it is assumed that the majority of them are housewives raising families, and are not able to work full-time. We believe a sufficient number of these women plus Physical Therapists, Speech Therapists, Occupational Therapists, Social Workers, and Home Health Aides would like to work part-time in their local
