Recreation Dept. Summer Programs

With summer right around the corner, the Las Vegas Recreation Department will open 15 school playgrounds on June 13 at 9 AM.

Many activities, new and old, are planned by the Recreation Department for the thousands of boys and girls who will swarm to the elementary and Junior high facilities.

According to Recreation Supervisor, Nick Sylvester, in charge of playgrounds, three top activities will highlight each of the areas, with many other worthwhile events taking place daily to interest and stimulate the youngsters.

On each of the elementary playgrounds, a children's theatre will be organized, with children's productions being rehearsed and produced by the boys and girls at the specific areas. Two or three plays at each school will be selected and presented to the parents, friends, and other children.

Dance and Rhythms will be instigated at each of the facilities, with youngsters learning all phases of folk dancing, square dancing, and baton twirling.

Arts and Crafts, on a high scale will also be offered, free of charge to all youngsters attending.

In addition to the aforementioned activities, boys and girls softball leagues are planned, with intraschool competition. City championships for both the boys and girls are scheduled for mid-August.

Various types of tournament, special activities, and games will also take place on the playgrounds from 9 AM to 5 PM.

Schools that will be open daily beginning June 13 until August 19 will be; Crestwood, DOOLITTLE CENTER, Dula Center, Red Rock, Twin Lakes, Rose Warren, J.S. Parks, Halle Hewetson, Bonanza, J. F. Miller, J. C. Fremont and Roy Martin, Garside, and Hyde Park Junior Highs, Rex Bell, J. T. McWilliams, and Walter Bracken Elementary Schools.

An in-service training program for approximately 50 summer playground leaders and assistants will take place on June 6 through June 10 to familiarize the summer employees with all phases of playground recreation.

YOUTH CHORUS

Lorenzi Park (Twin Lakes) will be the setting this summer of a Youth Chorus under the direction of Mrs. Joyce Goodwin Musser. All students of Junior or Senior High school age are welcome. The first meeting is to be held Monday, June 13, at 10 AM Room 18, Lorenzi Park.

The chorus director, Mrs. Joyce Goodwin Musser, has taught music in Las Vegas over the past 16 years. She has directed choruses at various schools including Crestwood, West Charleston, and Jim Bridger Junior High. The chorus is expected to meet at 10:00 Monday and Wednesday mornings through the summer months at Lorenzi Park. All students who will be entering Junior high school this next fall and all Senior High school students are welcome. Unselfish Investment Reaps Rich Award

NEW YORK--Civic mindedness and concern for the welfare of others paid off in more ways than one for Ivory Page, who in the short space of a year has become one of Humble Oil Refining Company's most successful service-station dealers in his home town of Lake Charles, La.

About seven years ago Page, a public-spirited leader in his community, began to worry about the unduly high rate of unemployment in the area surrounding Lake Charles. So he got together with some friends to try to do something about it.

"We figured that many people like us with steady incomes spend \$5 to \$10 a week that they could save without hardship," he said. "We decided--why not find a place to invest that money where it would bring a good return and do a good turn at the same time by being used to help create jobs."

IN THAT WAY, Investors of Calcasieu Parish, Inc., was formed. Page is its president. From its small beginning in 1959, it has become a Statewide chartered group of about 300 stockholders. Capital, invested at \$5 a share, is loaned on one-year notes to help qualified people open small businesses. There is a specific goal for each loan; Each new business should provide new jobs for at least five employees.

When Page, who had been working for another oil company, got a chance to go in business for himself with Humble a little over a year ago, he was able to supplement his own capital with a small amount from the organization he had helped establish.

Few investments prove their worth more quickly than Page's. While forecasts--at the time of his "grand opening" a year ago--calculated that his station could reach a monthly gasoline volume of 35,000 gallons within three years, he built up the business to 55,000 gallons a month in just one year.
