Bravery-Service Awards

Gov. Grant Sawyer today called on Nevadans to nominate candidates for the Young American Medals for Bravery and Service.

This is part of a national program sponsored by the U.S. Attorney General and the U.S. Department of Justice. Awards are made to youths under the age of 19 who have performed acts of extraordinary courage or who have achieved an outstanding record of service in their communities. Nominations are made by the 50 governors.

ernors.

"THERE ARE MANY young people throughout the state whose heroism and devotion to
others deserve the widest recognition," Governor Sawyer said. "I know Nevadans share in
this view and will want to nominate as many deserving young people from our state as
possible."

The governor will give public recognition personally to Nevada youths this year. This will be done by screening the state nominees for the national awards and then selecting Nevada award winners in the same categories--bravery and service.

A governor's awards committee of leading citizens will be named in June.

Through state awards, outstanding young Nevadans will receive special recognition even though they do not qualify for the national honors, Sawyer said.

SAWYER ANNOUNCED the first two state awards would be designated the "Mike Ingersoll Medals" in honor of the former University of Nevada student body president who died while

making a parachute jump last December.

Requirements state that nominees must have performed their acts of bravery or service during 1965. A candidate for the Young American Medal for Bravery must habitually reside in the United States but need not be a citizen. However, only citizens of the United States are eligible to receive the Young American Medal for Service.

Deadline for submission of nominations is

July 1, 1966.

Previous awards for bravery went to a 10year-old Florida boy who saved a friend from
an attacking alligator; a seven-year-old girl
who lost her life rescuing a tiny brother from
their burning house; and a 16-year-old girl who
ran back into the family's burning home to protect her invalid grandmother.

NEW YORK--(NPI)--Three Negroes and two Puerto Ricans were among 10 names submitted to Mayor Lindsay for membership on the police department civilian review board, which is to investigate complaints against members of the torce.

An 11-man screening panel selected the civilian candidates in an effort to improve relations between the police board and the publicespecially minority groups.

AND THE WEST-?

LOS ANGELES--(NPI)--An ominous calm settled over the Watts section last week following a verdict by a coroner's jury of 11 whites and one Negro, ruling accidental the death of Leonard Deadwyler, who was killed by a white policeman who had curbed the victim's car as he was driving his pregnant wife to a hospital.

he was driving his pregnant wife to a hospital.

The calm prevailed throughout an outbreak of window smashing after word of the verdict reached angry Negroes who have threatened more violent race riots.

RON KARENGA, a black nationalist leader told a steamed-up audience that they should prepare to defend themselves, if need be, from whites. He accused police of brutality towards the Negro community.

Karenga represents the neo-black nationalist organization known as "Us". Four members of the organization wearing T-shirts with a picture of the late Malcolm X, were arrested earlier and charged with carrying a loaded pistol, resisting arrest, assaulting a policeman and taking a prisoner from the police.

Bricks were hurled at white motorists driving through Watts. A spill-over to other California towns was indicated when Negro youths battered a school bus discharging passengers near California Park in Bakersfield where small-scale rioting had erupted. Later, incendiary fires caused damage to several buildings. Police officials sent 50 patrolmen to the area where 7,500 to 10,000 Negroes reside.

In Oakland, a Negro youth told persons attending a civil rights meeting that 700 school 'kickouts' are certain to cause trouble on streets of Oakland during summer months. He blames failure of the anti-poverty program, racial discrimination and poverty as contributing factors for high unemployment among 135,-000 Negroes and 33,000 Mexicans in Oakland. The city's total population is 400,000.
