I suggest to Mr. Pfaffl that if he is sincere concerning the problems on the Westside that he seek information elsewhere than from the PAL organization. I would further refer him to the April 21 issue of the VOICE which detailed the great swell of interest in the Westside poor after federal funds were made available to work with problems of the poor.

I am not at a loss for suggestions for the PAL organization, either, to utilize their "suniqueness", energies and charitable instinct.

There are a number of poor white people, including poor Catholics who need help. Toutilize a worn, but true cliche, I would remind them that Charity begins at home.
