Taking big bass isn't easy, but you can do it. All you need is patience, persistence—and this sound advice

FTER CAREFUL APPRAISAL of dozens of experts I've fished with over this continent, I've reached this conclusion: the difference between a fisherman and a big-bass fisherman is simply knowing what a big bass wants.

Just what does a big bass want? Well, here are a few things the notebook shows: proper time of year and time of day or night; ideal water temperature and clarity; most attractive lure color and action and a surprise once in a while.

Add to these the knowledge of why a bass strikes, when most big bass feed and where most big bass are found-and you have the makings of a fishing article that could turn you into a first-class big-bass fisherman!

So let's get with it.

First, let's talk about why a bass strikes. Ask this question of a dozen fishermen, and ten will tell you-because it's hungry. That's because those ten are thinking like humans; the other two might know some additional reasons.

By thinking like a bass, and analyzing a bit, they would come up with: anger, gluttony, greed, curiosity, reflex action and protective instinct.

And here, based strictly on personal opinion formed as the result of observation and discussion with many experts, is the reasoning behind these statements

You've located a big bass, know just which end of that old stump it likes to hang around. So you start casting at that spot. Dozens of casts later, sometimes more than 50-when ordinary fisherman would have given up long ago-you hook Mr. Big. That's because you knew from experience you could make him mad if you irked him long enough.

You catch a bass with its stomach full of small

By the time you recover to shut it off, you've got a bass on!
