Do they drink too much? Do they drive too fast? What about the kind of amusements they choose? Don't you often wish you knew more about your Son's choice of a steady date? Recognizing the general rebellion among youngsters against parental restraint, the idea here is that youngsters are prone to accept regulations which apply to one and all instead of only to a few.

Covering a range of subjects, the CODE
probes such "problems" as going steady at age
