of Investigation and were shown all the equipment and procedures that have something to do with the apprehension of criminals. We visited the Department of Justice, Department of Articles and the State Department. We toured the Supreme Court, the White House and the Federal Trust Building where all the money is made. We, also, toured the Capitol Building, the Senate Building, and, finally, the Smithsonian Institute.

After our visit to the nation's capital, we stopped in Pennsylvania and embarked on a sight-seeing tour of all the historic spots such as Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell, the Betsy Ross House, Benjamin Franklin's grave, and, of course, Valley Forge.

That afternoon, June 26, at 3:30 p.m., we arrived at our destination--New York City. Immediately upon arrival, I was called, along with two other delegates from the bus, to take pictures with a member of New York's Executive Staff assigned to greet our delegation.

After being assigned to our rooms in the Sheraton-Atlantic Hotel, we were given time to freshen up to attend our first meeting where we met with other pilgrims from other parts of the United States. Our total delegation was 140. We were given itineraries of our six-day schedule in New York, and pointers on comfortable and correct dress. All the members of the delegation got acquainted very quickly because our main objective was to learn about brotherly love, peace, and trust.

THE HIGHLIGHTS of our visit as delegates of the United Nation Pilgrimage to New York and the United Nations started with an escorted tour of the U.N. As a delegate, I learned the purpose of the U.N. and its organizations is to maintain peace among the nations. Disputes and differences arising between any of the nations involved, are the responsibility of the United Nation organization to seek peaceful resolution of the problems. We were informed of the failures as well as the successes of the or-

ganization, to date.

The grounds of the United Nation Buildings were donated by the Rockefeller family.

We crowded a lot into our six-day stay in New York. I visited the Statue of Liberty, made a three-hour boat tour of Manhattan Island where I saw ships coming in off the sea, old shipyards, and the most talked about place in New York--Wall Street where I also visited the New York Stock Exchange.

I went to see a stage play "Hostile Witness", starring Ray Milland at the Music Box Theater. And a dream of a lifetime--I saw the Annual Game of the Year between the New York Yankees and the New York Mets.

I visited the Jamaican Embassy where I learned quite a bit about Jamaica and its people. I also attended the American Embassy where a demonstration was going on protesting the Bombings in Viet Nam.

TO ROUND UP our trip to New York, we had a Speech Contest with a boy and a girl winner to be selected and runners-up acknowledged.

We were divided into groups, with the winners of each group to appear in the finals. I was fortunate enough to be third runner-up in my group.

We went to Radio City Music Hall and saw a stage show and the movie "Glass Bottom Boat" starring Doris Day.

Our trip to New York ended with a farewell Breakfast marking the last time all the Pilgrims from all over the nation would be together before dispersing for our return trips. It was very sad.

Leaving New York, our bus proceeded to Canada. Along the way, we stopped at such places as the Roosevelt Estate in Hyde Park, the Vanderbilt Mansion which is not far away. In Massachusetts, we visited Plymouth Rock, Bunker Hill, the U.S. Constitution Battleship, and Freedom Trail at Harvard University. We also visited historic Lexington, Concord and Charlemont.

ON WEDNESDAY, July 6, we left the United

States, entering the Dominion of Canada. We visited the American and Canadian Falls, better known as Niagara Falls. It was a beautiful sight at night. We took pictures of the Falls and visited the Hamilton Gardens.

After three days in Canada, we continued on our return trip stopping at such places as Greenfield Village, and the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Michigan; the Museum of Science & Industry in Jackson Park, Illinois. We also stopped at the Springfield, Illinois home of Abraham Lincoln and his family and pored over many of his speeches and letters.
