

Fitzgerald, Principal of Jo Mackey Elementary School, announced this week that registration for the 1966-67 school year for students in grades one thru six and Individual Learning will take place at the Jo Mackey school, 2726 Englestad, North Las Vegas, August 26 and 29 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. each day with the exception of the lunch hour from 12-noon until 1 p.m. when the office will be closed.

ALL FIRST GRADE students new to the dis-trict must have proof of birth, Fitzgerald said. The principal also reports that all teachers new to the school this year are to meet with him in the school library, August 24 at 9 a.m. On hand to meet and assist the new teachers with orientation to the school, will be the grade group leaders.

The Jo Mackey School attendance zone extends from the U.P. railroad track on the east to Highland on the west; Lake Mead Blvd., on the south, to Cheyenne Road on the north. For further details or information regarding any phase of the school's operation for the coming year, parents are encouraged to call the school at 642-3287 or 642-3288, and ask for Norma Cherry or Julia House, school secretaries whoare now on duty Monday thru Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.
