Marian Anderson Soloist At UN Tribute


MARIAN ANDERSON, America's greatest singing artist came out of retirement recently to appear as soloist in a special tribute to the United Nations at Grant Park Summer concerts, Chicago under the direction of James De Priest, her nephew.

IT WAS befitting on this special occasion that the seventh Symphony of Dvorak should have a significant place on the program and that De Priest used it for his debut appearance with the Grant Park Symphony orchestra. It may be remembered that Dvorak was instrumental in giving importance to Negro folk music and spirituals.

De Priest, 30, is one of the foremost conductors of this generation. In an unpretentious manner, he led the orchestra through the stalwart seventh Symphony with full assurance and maintained a precise continuity in its entirety.

Miss Anderson joined her nephew to sing a group of five spirituals which De Priest had orchestrated: "Go Down Moses", "Done Foun" My Los' Sheep", "Let Us Break Bread Together", "He'c Got The Whole World In His Hands", and "Ride Gn King Jesus".

In ther singing, there was ever present an awareness of sublime greatness and nobility that will be an eternal characteristic of America's great singer. The audience would not permit her to leave until she had communed with them through Schubert's "Ave Maria."


