My own bristly countenance you are perhaps familiar with, having been forced to endure it on page three of the VOICE for the past year. Unfortunately, my beard has gone the way of all good beards--down the drain. Too bad. I was rather attached to it. Even my wife liked it. In fact, she was tickled with it.

The library itself has been expanded. All the books--12,000 of them--have been moved into a new room, to be called the Stack Room. (The word "stack" refers to the stacks of bookshelves.) Also in this room are kept the latest magazines and newspapers, arranged conveniently near an informal reading area comfortably furnished with couches and stuffed chairs as well as reading tables.

THE MAIN ROOM has been converted into a large reading and study area composed of some seventy-five carrels (small, walled-in desks) where students may experience a certain degree of privacy. In one end of this room is the charging counter (where books are checked out and returned) and off the sides of the room are five conference rooms as well as the librarians' offices and workroom. There is also a small area known as the Careers Room where students may obtain information on universities and occupations.

Another new addition to the library is the Individual Study Center. This is a large, carpeted room with forty private study carrels. Ideally, this will serve as a study room where the serious student can work with the least distraction. Naturally, any student causing any sort of disturbance will be given the heave-ho.

LOCATED BETWEEN the main study room and the Stack Room is the Reference Room, where fact-books, encyclopedias, etc., can be found, as well as back issues of magazines.

A certain amount of student help will be required in the library. There are positions for between twenty and thirty students who wish to work in the library. This will be similar to a regular high school course and high school credit will be given upon completion of the required amount of study and work. Also, there is a need for N.Y.C. workers both before and after school each day.

Classes at Western run from 8 a.m. to 2:45 p.m., but the library will be open both before and after school. These hours are for all students of Western, and the librarians and faculty urge the students to take advantage of the library to study and learn. That is what it is there for.

Education Grant

NAIROBI--(NPI) --- Kenya has just received a \$7 million credit from the International Development Association (IDA), an affiliate of the World Bank, to assist in expanding its secondary education system. The project calls for construction of new and expansion of existing general secondary, technical and teacher training institutions and for purchase of needed furniture and equipment.

"JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE" BY POLICE AGAIN

BIRMINGHAM, Ala.--(NPI)--The fatal shooting of Edgar D. Edwards, 23, the fifth Birminghamian slain allegedly by police bullets, has been ruled as "justifiable homicide" by the office of County Coroner James O. Butler.

Local police records show Edwards was shot to death by a shotgun blast allegedly fired by Police Officer John L. Cousins during an incident last Aug. 20. Edwards was pronounced dead on

arrival at University hospital, investigators said. Homicide Detectives Edward K. Alley and Joseph R. Bieker said that Edwards was shot by Officer Cousins after police received a "call on a prowler." Det. Bieker quoted Officer Cousins as saying that when he came upon Edwards trying to get into an apartment, the victim "attacked" him with a knife.
