FOUR ANCHORS THAT HOLD

Text: "They cast four anchors out of the stern, and wished for the day." Acts 27:29.

THESE WORDS cause from the story of St. Paul's shipwreck-From the outset the trip was beset with difficulties, then and there, things began to go wrong the earnest. The wind blew steadily from the wrong direction. "The south wind blew softly." The accounts of how many disasters can be begun with those words!

And these one night at midnight toward the end of the second week, they heard a sound more ominous than the shrieking of the wind and the

crashing of the waves. Over the noise of the storm there came the booming of surf on a lee

There are any num ber of anchors that people have used when hey have found themselves drifting on a lee shore, but since the story of St. Paul's voyage mentions four, let me limit myself to that number in speaking of the anchors which not only 1, but many other people, have found to be capable of holding

through the night.



The first anchor is REV. D. M. CLARK light in weight. By itself it will not hold for long. But because it is light in weight, it is the easiest one to throw overboard and, therefore, it goes first it consists of reminding yourself that no matter how dark the night may be, the day is bound to follow it. The blackest nights of suffering are not endless, they are followed by the day. That is, as I have said, a lightweight anchor and it will not hold indefinitely. Many of the nights through which we struggle seem endless and some are too long to be endured by optimism alone. But this kind of hope is only the first anchor.

THE SECOND anchor is much heavier in weight and it holds much longer. It is forged of the kindness of people. I wish I could count the times when someone has said to me, after a time of trouble, "I can't get over it; people

have been so wonderful.'

Trouble of course, teaches us two lessons about people. The bitter lesson is that some of the people who you think are your friends can let you down. That discovery can be the heaviest blow imaginable. But it is far outweighted by another discovery--that quite ordinary men and women are capable of love and loyalty and self-sacrifice for which they ask nothing in return except the knowledge that they have been of help to someone who needed them. The story of the shipwreck provides a beautiful example

There is no end of the love and concern and self-sacrifice of which ordinary men and women are capable when the occasion demands. People

are a strong anchor.

THE THIRD anchor is the knowledge that God remains the same, steadfast and immovable. The sailors of Paul's ship could not see the stars above the clouds. All around them was raging water. Beneath the churning sea there was something steadfast in which to take hold.

Just as the stars keep shining above the clouds of the worst storm, so the God who made the stars remains the same above the changes and chances of this mortal life. And underneath the waves on which we toss, the ground is firm.

THE FOURTH anchor is the knowledge of Jesus Christ. The longer I live the more obvious it is to me that to come to know the story of Jesus is the most wonderful thing that can happen to a man or woman. That story says two things: first, that God cares enough for men to have sent his Son into the world to die for them; and second, that a human being can suffer the worst misfortunes that life can bestow and still turn defeat into victory.
