**ALABAMA'S WALLACE
SEGREGATIONIST IDOL**

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. - (NPI)--Gov. George C. Wallace got a two-year jump on other candidates as he started his campaign for the Presidency in 1968--and announced that his "Alabama Movement" was spreading all over the country. Wallace was making a big hit with segregationists both here and in Mississippi by playing on racial fears and denouncing critics of his policies as Communists.

THE ALABAMA governor denounced federal school desegregation guidelines, the "wicked" civil rights law of 1964, and big-city newspapers run by "left-wingers." Segregationists cheered as he declared that "an Alabamian would make as good a President as one from Ohio or New York, and a darn sight better than one from Texas, I can tell you that."

Announcing that his "Alabama Movement" was spreading to all parts of the nation, Wallace said Americans from other states are expressing gratitude for being provided an alternative to the two "left-wing" national parties. "People all over the country are saying, 'Thank goodness for Alabama,'" he said.

(The name Wallace gave his campaign was ironically the same as that used by Dr. Martin Luther King's civil rights drive in Alabama.)

Wallace also went to Meridian, Miss., to help the campaign of fellow segregationist Sen. James O. Eastland, and met an enthusiastic reception. Some Mississippians were more anxious to meet Wallace than Eastland, who has a long segregationist record of his own.

EASTLAND IS BEING opposed by a Republican, U.S. Rep. Prentiss Walker, who has tried to picture himself as more of a segregationist than Eastland by charging that Eastland was responsible for the appointment of federal judges who have struck down Dixie segregation statutes.

In danger of being "outbacklashed," Eastland called on Wallace for support--and possibly saved himself from defeat by distributing photos of him taken with the segregationist Alabama governor.

Addressing a rally for Eastland, Wallace chortled that the country is swinging his way. He cited the victory of Lester Maddox in the Georgia Democratic Party's gubernatorial primary as a victory for his side, and noted that candidates across the nation had saved themselves from defeat by running on a platform that sounded like it was written in Alabama and Mississippi.

Wallace's wife must win the Alabama race for governor if Wallace expects his campaign for the Presidency to be successful. But Wallace didn't appear to be worried about that. He was already spending as much time promoting his own White House bid as supporting his wife's candidacy.

WALLACE EVEN went before the Alabama Democratic conference, a Negro organization, to urge it to support all Democrats--including his wife. Negro Alabamians are said to be split between Mrs. Wallace; Dr. Carl Ray Johnson, an independent candidate; and U.S. Rep. James D. Martin, a Republican.

Demos "Rally-Que"

Gov. John Connally of Texas today informed Nevada Democrats he will be in Las Vegas for the party's Nov. 5. "Rally-Que" at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

"I am deeply honored," the Lone Star State's chief executive wired Sam Boyd, chairman of the event, "and I assure you I will be there to join in the tribute to your outstanding slate of Democratic candidates."

The "rally-que" will pay tribute to Rep. Walter S. Baring, Gov. Grant Sawyer and Lieutenant Governor nominee, John Foley as well as all Democratic candidates for state and county office.

As governor of one of the nation's largest states, Connally has received nation-wide recognition and acclaim.

Connally was appointed Secretary of the Navy in 1960 by then President-elect John F. Kennedy, a post he resigned a year later to make his triumphant bid for the governorship.

He and Mrs. Connally were with President and Mrs. Kennedy on their tour of Texas when the President was assassinated. Connally suffered critical wounds from one of the three shots fired and required extended hospitalization.

Connally will deliver the major address of the evening at the "rally-que", Boyd said. In addition, Sens. Alan Bible and Howard Cannon will participate in the program, Boyd said.

Doors to the Las Vegas Convention Center will open at 6 p.m. Nov. 5, with free barbeque, refreshments and entertainment on tap for all attending.

"Several Democratic clubs of Southern Nevada are planning to arrive in car caravans, and residents of the area who wish to participate in a caravan can contact the Central Committee for information," Boyd added.

Following the "rally-que" Democratic candidates are scheduled to attend the Young Democrats annual Fall Ball at the Flamingo Hotel.
