### "BOSSA NOVA" MASS

CHICAGO--(NPI)--Something new has hap-pened to the Catholic church's most ancient rite and hallowed tradition -- the Mass. It is now being sung to a bossa nova beat by the 20-voice choir at St. Brendan's Parish for Young People.

Called the "Missa Bossa Nova," the Mass also had a television premier last Sunday, morning via the CBS local outlet, WBBM-TV, on the weekly "Man Alive" series hosted by Father Edward Wrobleski.

On hand for the program were the composer of the Latiny-styled Mass, the Rev. Peter Scholtes, assistant pastor at St. Brendan's and his drum-playing arranger, Fr. Louis Burrell, S.V.D., assistant pastor, St. Anselm parish.

When questioned about possible audience reception of his radical work, Fr. Scholtes remarked, "We know that many people will be shook by Missa Bossa Nova! And we don't impose it on anyone who doesn't like it. All we ask is that no one impose their music on us," he added.

Going a bit further, Fr. Scholtes explained, "I want the kids to know that this is theirs.... and it is. They are responding magnificently. Each week, we have a mass, followed by a free breakfast and discussion around some vital topic. And they do all the work themselves.'

Another comment made by Father William Quinian pastor, St. Brendans, is indicative of the responsive stir the new mass has generated. He said: "All I know is that when we started the Parish for Young People using the Bossa Nova Mass, we saw teen-agers at church whom we hadn't seen since they left grammar school. How can anyone argue with that kind of success?

The young people's parish is an experiment begun this past summer by St. Brendans teens-a sort of "parish within a parish," with its own with its own mass every Sunday at 11 a.m. It has its own place of worship--a brick-walled former storage room (affectionately called "The Cave") in St. Brendans school--its own organization and pays its own way.

But that's not all to the "Missa Bossa Nova." It has been recorded under Flair label and is destined to be sung throughout the nation and perhaps the world in years to come.

ATLANTA -- (NPI) -- Stokely Carmichael, chairman, Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, has vowed to go to prison rather than enter military service if classified 1-A.

Currently classified 1-Y by his draft board because of past failure to meet induction standards, he was asked on what ground he would refuse induction. "I don't care what it is. I'll go to Leavenworth," he answered.

Mounting public protests prompted his draft board to re-examine his case. He recently completed a series of examinations at St. Albans Naval hospital, Queens, N. Y., where he underwent two days of consultations.

## Freedom Budget Proposed

NEW YORK--(NPI)--A. Philip Randolph, has unveiled a \$100 billion "Freedom Budget, to wipe out poverty in the United States by 1975. Randolph, president, AFL-CIO Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, said the budget introduced a new element in current anti-poverty programs -the deadline.

In addition, to seeking the abolition of poverty, by 1975, the budget proposes a minimum wage of \$2 an hour by 1968 or 1969. It also, calls for guaranteed income and job training for all. "The Freedom Budget does not ask for the moon," a budget proposal notes. It "only (asks) justice here on earth, in the land best able to afford it.

The budget has been hailed by Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive director; Bayard Rustin, planner of the 1963 March on Washington; New York's Senators Jacob K. Javits (R) and Robert F. Kennedy (D); and Walter Reuther, president, United Auto Workers and AFL-CIO vice-president.

The plan would enlarge welfare service, build 100,000 new public school classrooms, and seek to wipe out slum ghettos. According to Randolph, it would weld together current anti-poverty
