ACCORDING TO voter tally at the Las Vegas SUN, the 25 predominantly Negro precincts in Las Vegas voted 3614 for Sawyer and 303 for Laxalt. 1395 voters favored Walter Baring, while only 66 voted for Ralph Kraemer.

Once more the Negro Democrats have demonstrated their party loyalty. Had the other democrats in Clark County demonstrated half the party loyalty, Nevada would have returned Grant Sawyer for a third term, elected John Foley, and nearly every Demo candidate on the Clark County ballot.

The Negro vote is the only dependable vote that the Democrats have in all of Nevada. The

Demo party must demonstrate keener appreciation for this loyalty, or risk the shift of their only block voting power to the G.O.P.

Should the Nevada Negroes desert the Democrats for the Republicans, it would be a long dark day before the Democrats would shine

again in Nevada political lime-light.

ELECTION STORY BROOKES VICTORY A "MIXED BLESSING"

NEW YORK--(NPI)--Negro candidates won at least two major victories in the election upsets registered last week across the country. But the losses resulting from "backlash" triumphs for racist candidates far outweighed the gains.

In the major election victories, the nation got its first Negro U. S. Senator in the North and the first Negro sheriff in Alabama since Reconstruction. However, it also saw the defeat of a civilian-dominated police review board in New York, the overwhelming victory of Mrs. George Wallace as Governor of Alabama, and an election toss-up in Georgia between an out-and-out racist and an arch-conservative.

At the same time, a bid for political control, the "Black Panther" bloc in Alabama appeared to have fizzled.

The smashing victory of Massachusetts Atty. Gen. Edward W. Brooke in a race for U.S. Senator from that state was itself a mixed blessing. Brooke is the first Negro to win a seat in the U. S. Senate since Reconstruction days. His Democratic opponent, Gov. Endicott Pea-body, however, has been far more active in promoting open housing and other civil rights causes. Gov. Peabody's mother is remembered as a participant in recent rights marches in the South, during which she was jailed.
