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NAT TURNER Leader of America's Greatest Slave Revolt (1800-1831)

Conclusion

"BEFORE MORNING dawned, he had col-lected an army of fifty. Riding ahead with a mounted guard, he surrounded each mansion, holding it besieged until his foot-soldiers arrived to complete the slaughter. In this way some 50 white persons were killed without the loss of a single man by the attackers.

"The neighborhood was sparsely settled by whites. Not far away was Jerusalem, the county seat. Nat meant to surprise the inhabitants and kill them before the news of his invasion could reach Richmond or Peterburg. He would seize

arms, ammunition and money. "He gave the order to march. Every white person met on the way was killed. When the men came to the gate of the Parker plantation, someone suggested that they go in, kill the master,

and pick up more recruits.

"Nat objected. Time was pressing. They must hurry on to Jerusalem. But the majority thought otherwise, and Nat reluctantly yielded. Forty of the men started off for the mansion six miles away. Nat, with the remainder stayed behind to block the roadway.

'HOURS PASSED and the men did not return. Nat started off in search of them. While he was away, a body of armed white men appeared. The rebels were just retreating when

Nat and the others returned.
"The whites, sure that they could bluff the Negroes, shouted to them to drop their guns on penalty of a whipping. Nat, reminding his men that they were no longer creatures of the banjo or the shake-down, but soldiers of Christ fighting for the right, gave the order to fire. When the smoke cleared, the whites were fleeing in disorder leaving behind several of their number, dead or wounded.

"Nat dashed after them, cutting them down. The survivors ran into a strong body of white reinforcements. In the encounter that followed. Nat's force was beaten and he fled with twenty others. Still determined to attack Jerusalem, he urged his men to follow him, but they hesitated. He then picked up twenty more men and attacked the plantation of Major Ridley. When he reached the plantation of Dr. Hunt the next day, he found the whites there organized, and after a skirmish, he was forced to retreat. Telling his men to scatter, he instructed them where to meet that night. No one came, however. Nat was alone. Knowing that it was the end, he took to the woods.

"IN THE MEANTIME the news had reached Richmond and the United States government appealed to. It sent two warships, the Warren and Natchley, to the scene with 800 marines. The Virginia State Militia was also summoned Virginia

in force.
"An indiscriminate slaughter of the blacks began. Fully a hundred were killed the first day alone. Others were tortured for secrets they

were supposed to know.

"Six hundred men with bloodhounds started after Nat. Digging a hole under a pile of fence-rails in the woods, he hid there for eight weeks.

"At last he was cornered by accident. He had left some fresh meat in his hiding place and while he was away, a dog, attracted by its scent, came in and ate it. The next day, the dog, who

happened to be out with a group of slaves, came back. Nat was in andit barked wildly. The slaves came up to investigate, and Nat, thinking that they had come in search of him, begged them not to betray him.

"Learning who he was, they fled in terror, running straight to their master to tell the news. A posse of 1,000 armed men set out to look for him. They finally discovered him on top of a tree, where he had taken refuge. When they threatened to shoot, he came down and gave himself up.

"A FEW DAYS later he was brought to trial. Nat faced his accusers with courage. Thousands came to catch a glimpse of the man who had spread the fear of insurrection in all the Slave States. Nat boldly acknowledged his deeds and told of his hope of freeing his people. His law-yer, Gray, said: 'Clothed with rags, covered with chains, yet daring to raise his manacled hands to heaven, with a spirit soaring above the attributes of men, I looked at him, and my blood froze in my veins.

He was hanged on November 11, 1831, walking serenely to the gallows convinced to the end that he had obeyed the dictates of the voice within-the voice of God and the Right.

"His revolt brought many sleepless nights to the slaveholders and the whites in all the slave states for years to come. How could they be sure that on their plantation was not another Nat Turner waiting for a chance to butcher them?

'Nat Turner, with his talents suppressed by servitude, is surely a case of one who was capable of being of great service to America and to humanity but whose genius, thrust aside by the hand of a most brutal system, was diverted into an instrument of ruthless slaughter and revenge. Between fifty-five and sixty-one whites were killed.

*Footnote

"The rebels made no attempt to violate the white women. R. R. Howison says, 'It is remarkable that through the whole series of assaults not one female was violated. Remembering the brutal passions of the Negro we can only account for this fact by supposing the actors had been appalled by the very success of their hid-eous enterprise. (Hist. of Virginia, Vol. 2, p. 443. 1848.) The more likely answer to this is that Nat and his followers hated white people too thoroughly for that, as did the Haitlans in their massacre of the French, who also killed the white women but did not rape them."
